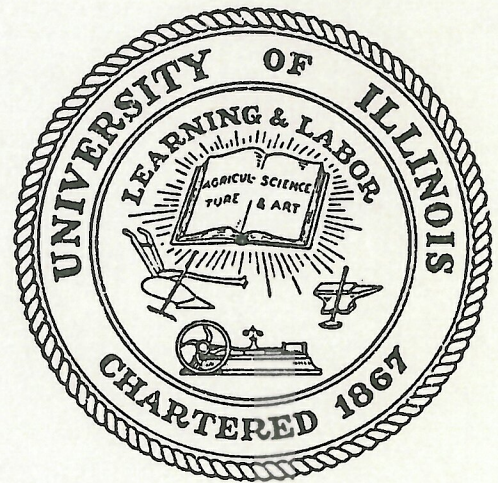

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EXPLANATORY NOTES FOR RETENTION AND GRADUATION

Graduation and retention rates are the result of many variables including academic performance, academic preparation, motivation, and academic integration. Other factors which seem to influence graduation and retention include part/full-time attendance, student age, family responsibilities, commuter/resident attendance, first-generation college attendance, socioeconomic status, employment, and indebtedness. The extent to which these factors combine and contribute to graduation and retention is not fully understood, but there is a considerable body of research which has documented the complexities of the issue.

Throughout recent history the graduation rate of students in the United States who enter a university as beginning freshmen and earn bachelor's degrees from that same university four to six years later is approximately 50 percent. A freshman class with higher average ability, motivation, preparation, greater full-time attendance, etc. will graduate at higher rates than that average. The reverse is also true.

However, there are no hard and fast prediction models. The intervening variables are numerous and interrelated. For example, high motivation certainly can overcome under-preparedness just as low motivation can negate high ability. Better academic preparation may be the result of high academic ability or the consequence of higher socioeconomic status and thus a more positive high school environment.

It is tempting to compare institution-wide graduation rates among universities without accounting for the makeup of the student body. The reader is cautioned not to make blanket comparisons, for example, in the graduation and retention rates provided in this Data Book for the two University of Illinois campuses. The student bodies of the campuses are different, and thus comparisons between the two would parallel the customary apples-to-oranges relationship. The reader should bear in mind that at the first term of enrollment at UIC over 20 percent of new transfers are part-time students (eventually nearly 55 percent become part-time students), almost one-half are admitted as freshmen or sophomores, the average age is 23.4 years, and about 90 percent commute from off campus. In addition, new transfers make up almost one-half of the new students. This profile differs markedly from the new students enrolled at UIUC of which only about 20 percent are new transfers, and most transfers enter at the junior level.

One other caveat should be emphasized: Retention data presented in this and in previous Data Books were gathered from several different studies, each employing slightly different methodologies. The footnotes section of each table describes the definitions used for that table.

EXPLANATORY NOTES FOR CHICAGO STUDENT DATA

In 1986, the Health Sciences Center campus and the University Center campus merged and became the University of Illinois at Chicago. To provide consistency in reporting enrollment data, figures for 1983 through 1986 have been adjusted to reflect this merger.

In 1984, UIC initiated a Pharmacy Doctorate Program at the professional level. Students in this program were formerly included in the under-graduate pharmacy enrollment totals. Due to this change in classification, students entering the Pharmacy Doctorate Program from 1984 through 1986 were subtracted from the undergraduate enrollment totals reported in the Enrollment Tables produced by the University Office for Academic Policy Analysis. This explains the increases in Professional enrollments from 1984 through 1986.

In 1993 the College of Kinesiology became a part of the College of Associated Health Professions. When comparisons are made between years, the data for the two colleges are combined.

Current and historical enrollment data for UIC were gathered from five sources: 1) Office of Data Resources and Institutional Analysis (DRIA), 2) the Student Data Book which is produced by DRIA, 3) the Enrollment Tables produced by the University Office for Academic Policy Analysis, 4) Integrated Post-Secondary Education Data System (IPEDS), reported by the University of Illinois to the Illinois Board of Higher Education, and 5) the University Student Research Data Base (RDB). Historical data were consistent in almost all instances; however, when discrepancies occurred, enrollment figures reported in the Enrollment Tables were used. Current data were taken from the University Student Research Data Base.

HIGHLIGHTS

- *During the past ten years, total enrollment on the Chicago campus was stable. As Figure 1 illustrates, graduate and professional enrollment increased since fall 1983 while undergraduate enrollment decreased. Fall 1993 enrollment is higher than fall 1991 and 1992 at the undergraduate and graduate levels. Enrollment at the graduate level is at the highest point in the last ten years.*
- *As indicated in Table 2, the number of beginning freshmen is at the highest level since fall 1983. Transfer and readmitted students are at a lower number and make up a smaller proportion of new students than in previous years. Continuing students in 1993 are at a lower number than in 1983, but constitute a larger percentage of the student body.*
- *Most colleges experienced decreases in undergraduate enrollments since 1983, although levels fluctuated in the intervening years. The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, enrolling more undergraduates than all other colleges combined, is at the highest enrollment level of the period.*

Graduate II enrollment, generally doctoral candidates, has increased from less than 1,450 students in 1987 and 1988 to over 1,850 in 1993.

- *Figures 4-6 illustrate trends in undergraduate, graduate, and professional enrollment by gender. For the first time in the ten-year period, there are more females than males at the undergraduate level.*
- *The undergraduate cohort is represented by a more diverse racial/ethnic population in fall 1993 than in fall 1983. Figure 8 illustrates that, as a percent of the total, Hispanic and Asian/Pacific Islander enrollment has risen while, as a percentage, Black enrollment has fallen. At the graduate level, the proportion of Black, Hispanic, and Asian/Pacific Islander students increased, and White student enrollment decreased as a percentage of total.*
- *The maps in Figure 10 illustrate geographic residency. While the graduate/professional cohort represents a wider geographic distribution, 97 percent of undergraduates are Illinois residents.*
- *The geographic origin of international students is displayed in Table 9. Over eighty percent of international students enroll at the graduate level.*

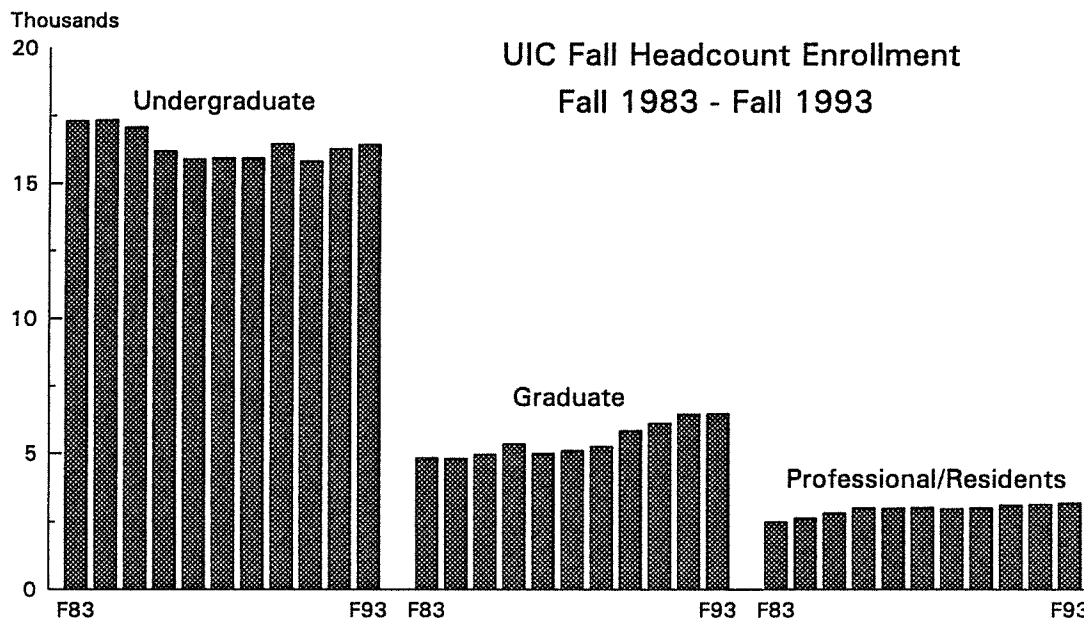

Fall 1983 - Fall 1993

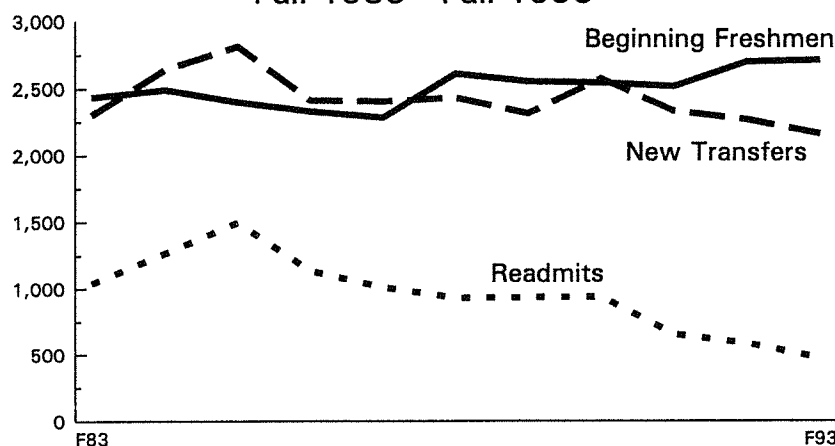

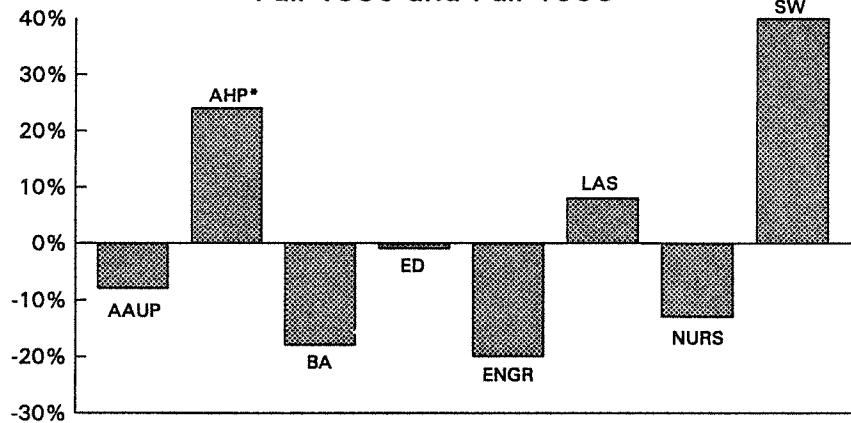

Fall 1983 - Fall 1993

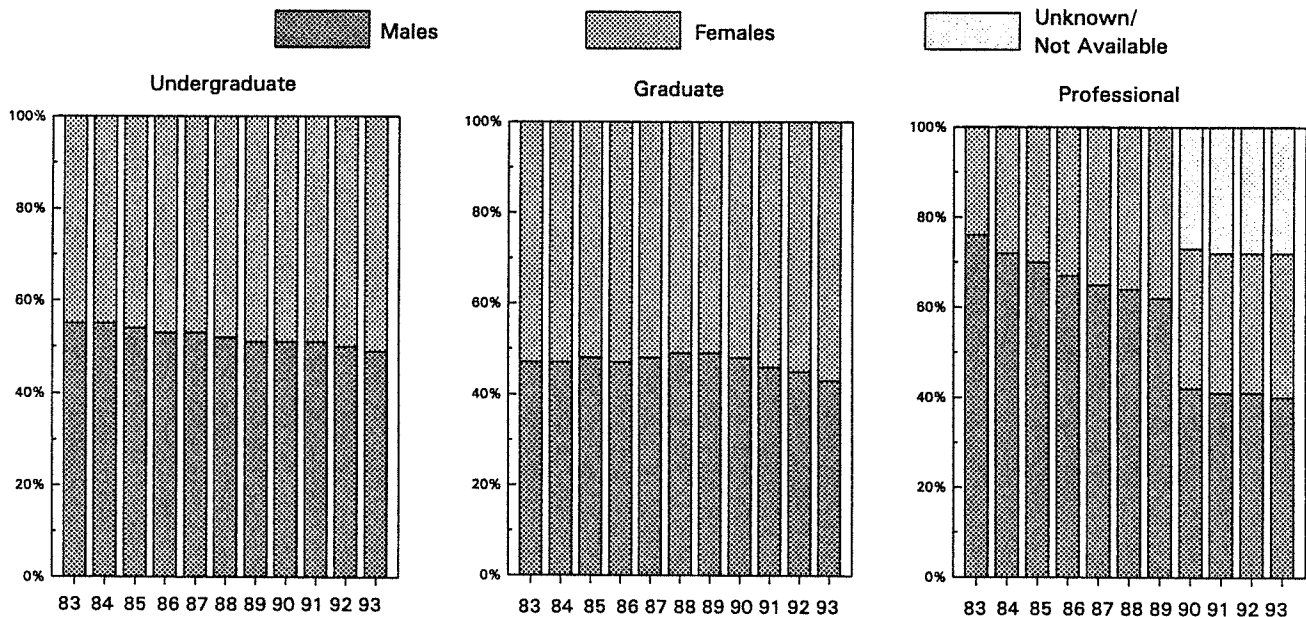

1983 and 1993

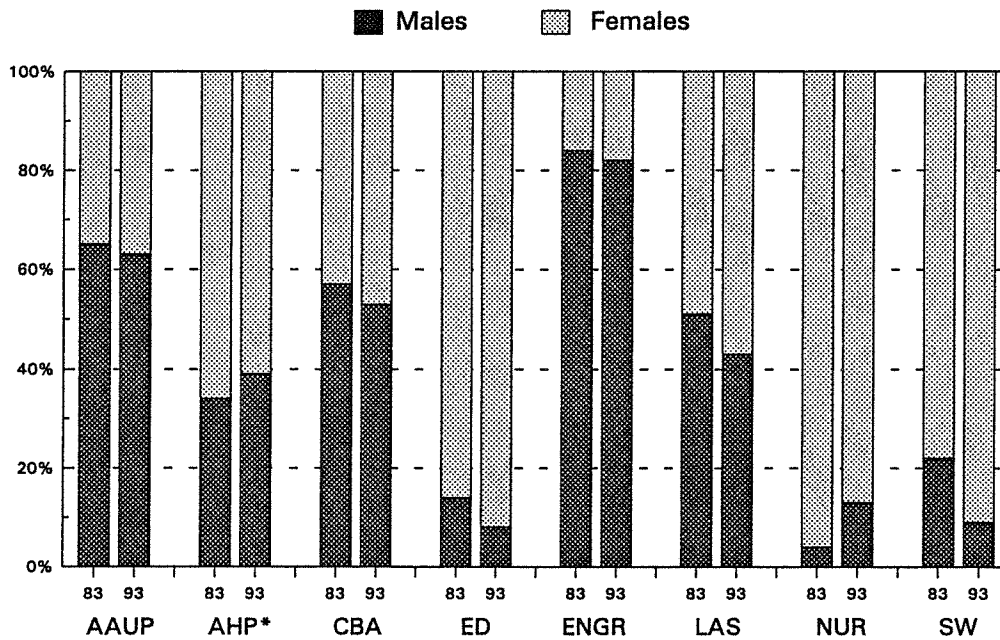

Fall 1983 - Fall 1993

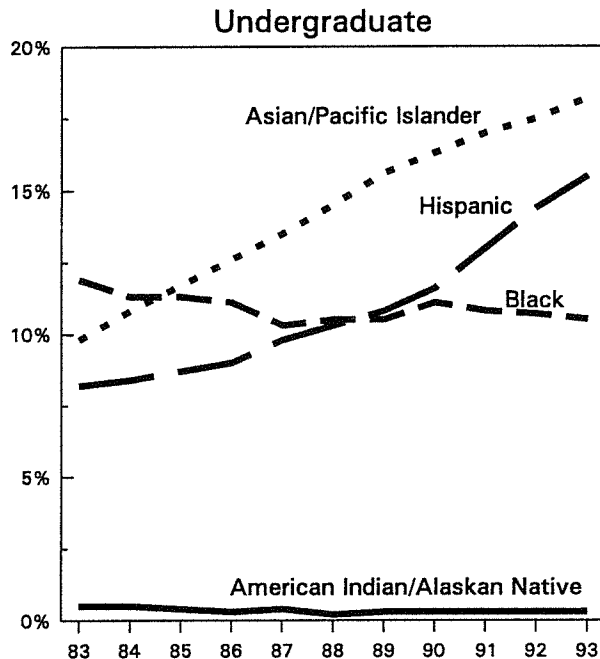

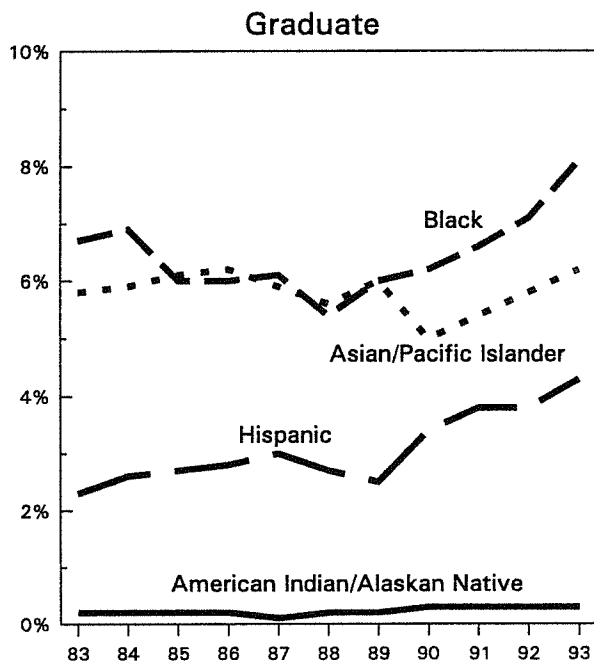

FALL 1993**

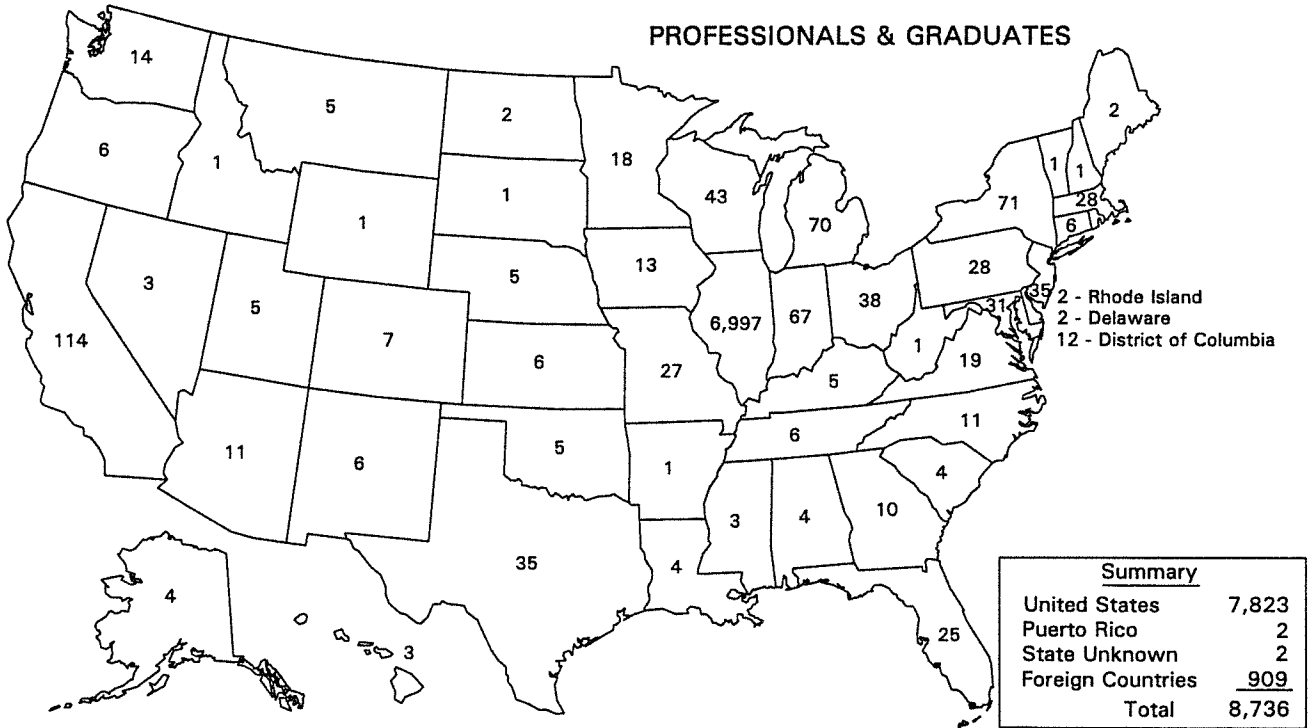
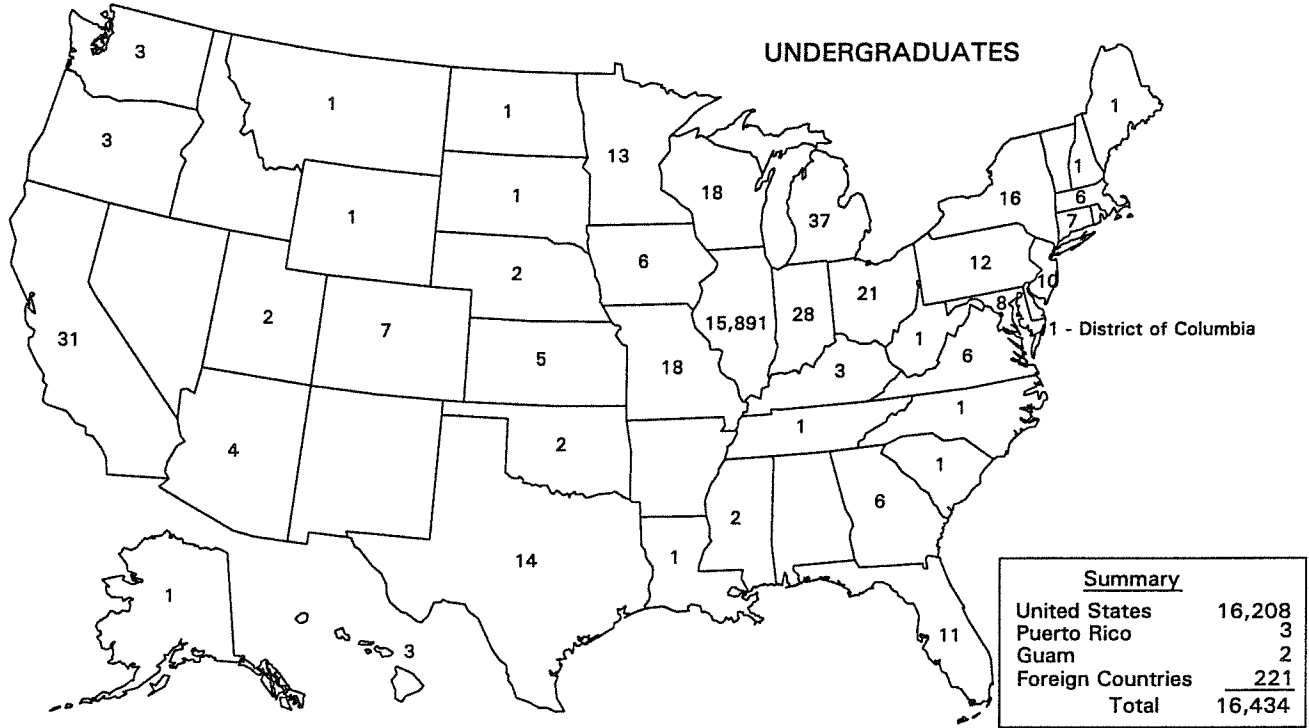

New Student Characteristics

UIC

HIGHLIGHTS

- *Table 10 indicates that beginning freshman enrollment has increased to the highest point in the past ten years. Over the period, new freshman numbers decreased in the mid-eighties, then increased into the nineties. The increase can be attributed to higher numbers in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.*
- *In the last ten years, new transfer enrollment decreased from a high of over 2,800 to the current enrollment of 2,159 transfer students. Over half of all transfers enrolled in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. See Table 11.*
- *The mean high school percentile rank of beginning freshmen has declined somewhat (Table 12) while the average American College Test (ACT) composite score is stable (Table 13). Because of a change from ACT to the Enhanced ACT tests, a comparison of the scores cannot be made across the ten-year period.*
- *Tables 14-16 present selected demographics of the fall 1993 beginning students, and geographic characteristics such as origin, residency, and transfer institution are mapped in Figures 12-14. The Chicago metropolitan area continues to be the main source of new students--supplying over 80 percent of the UIC new undergraduate enrollment. Likewise, Illinois residents comprise nearly eighty percent of new graduate students.*

Fall 1983 and Fall 1993**

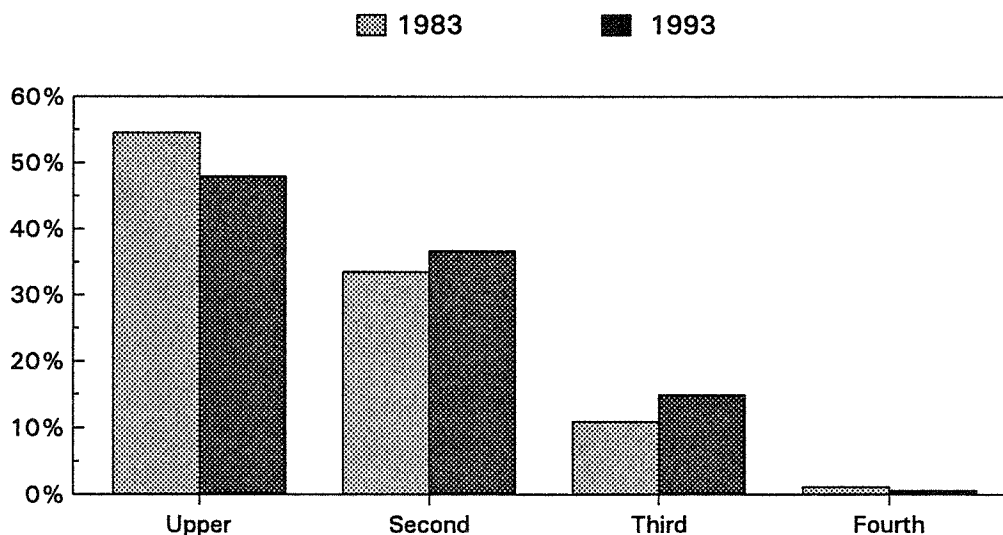

In October 1989, the American College Testing Program (ACT) introduced the Enhanced ACT Assessment. This test, usually taken by high school juniors and seniors, was similar but not identical to the previous assessment instrument. Because changes in the new test yielded differences in the scoring distribution, scores on the two tests are NOT interchangeable. ACT has published concordance tables which show scores on the former test to be equivalent to a higher score on the Enhanced Test. To convert the former score to an equivalent Enhanced score, the rule of thumb at the upper end is to add one (1) to the former test score and on the lower end to add anywhere from three to five points to the former score. Recent average scores for Illinois test takers are reported above in order to better compare the composite means.

* Both the U of I and Illinois 1990 test data include scores which were converted to the original ACT from Enhanced scores.

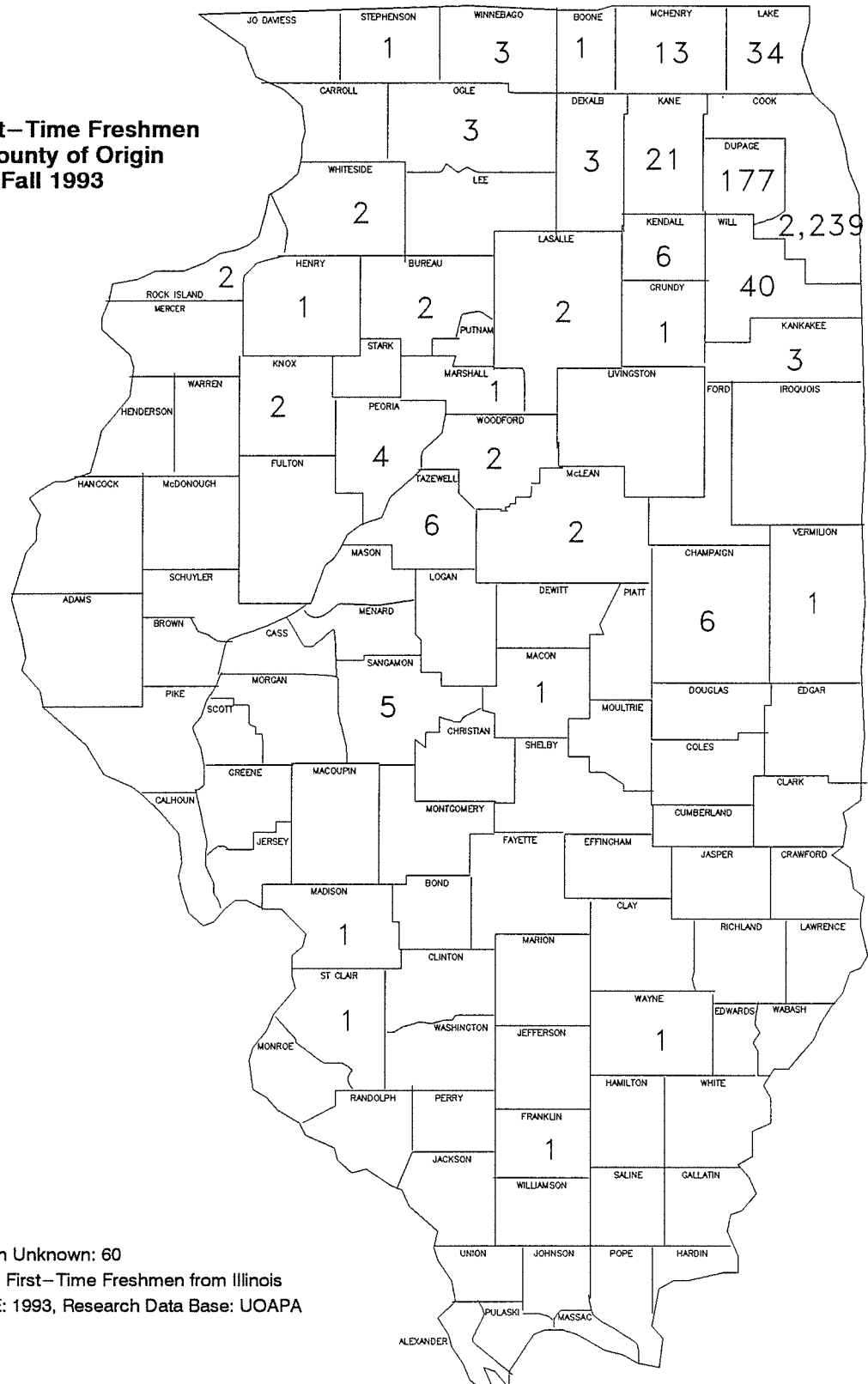

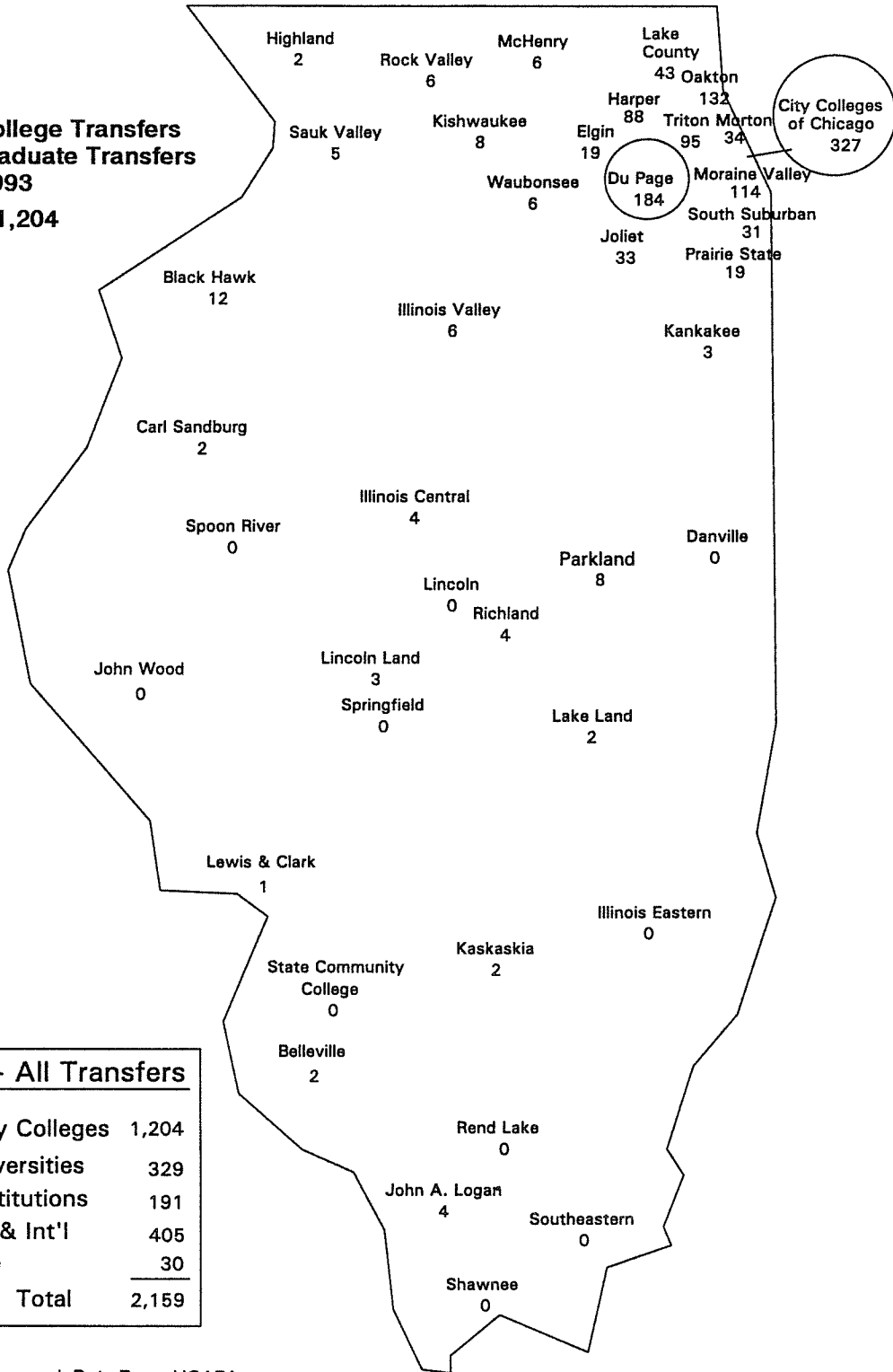
**UIC First-Time Freshmen

FALL 1993

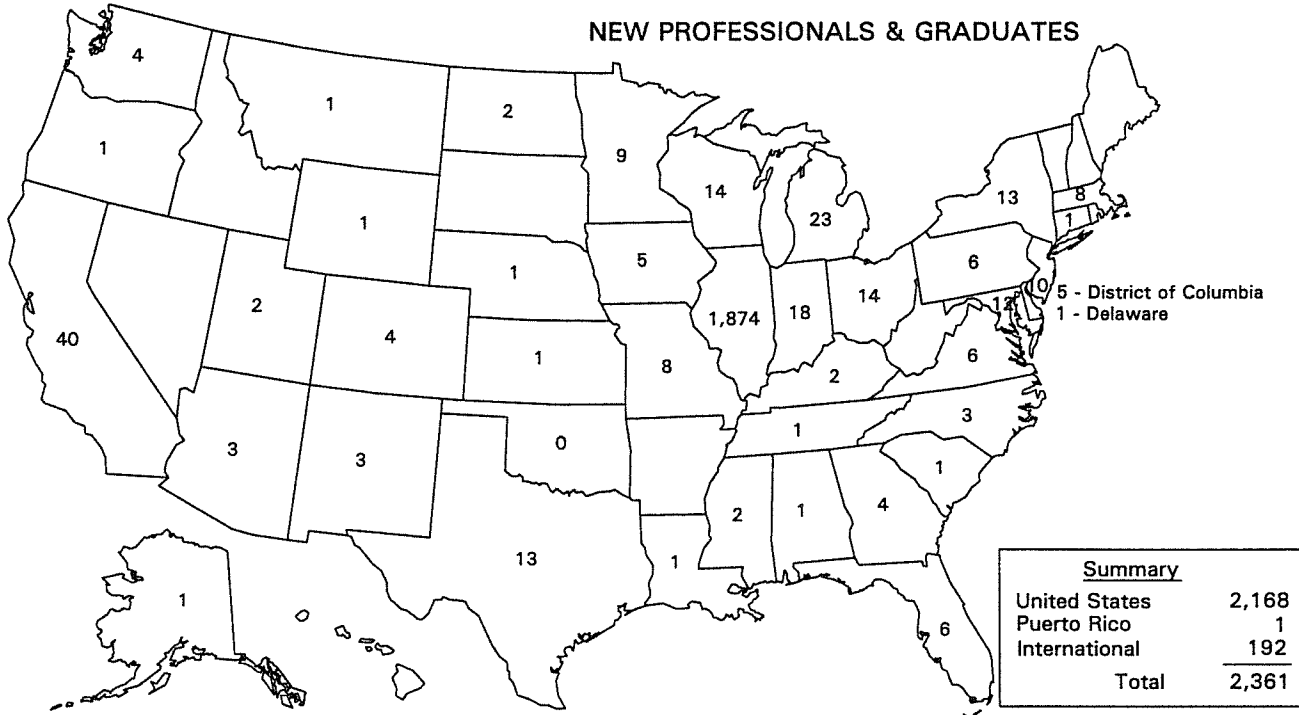
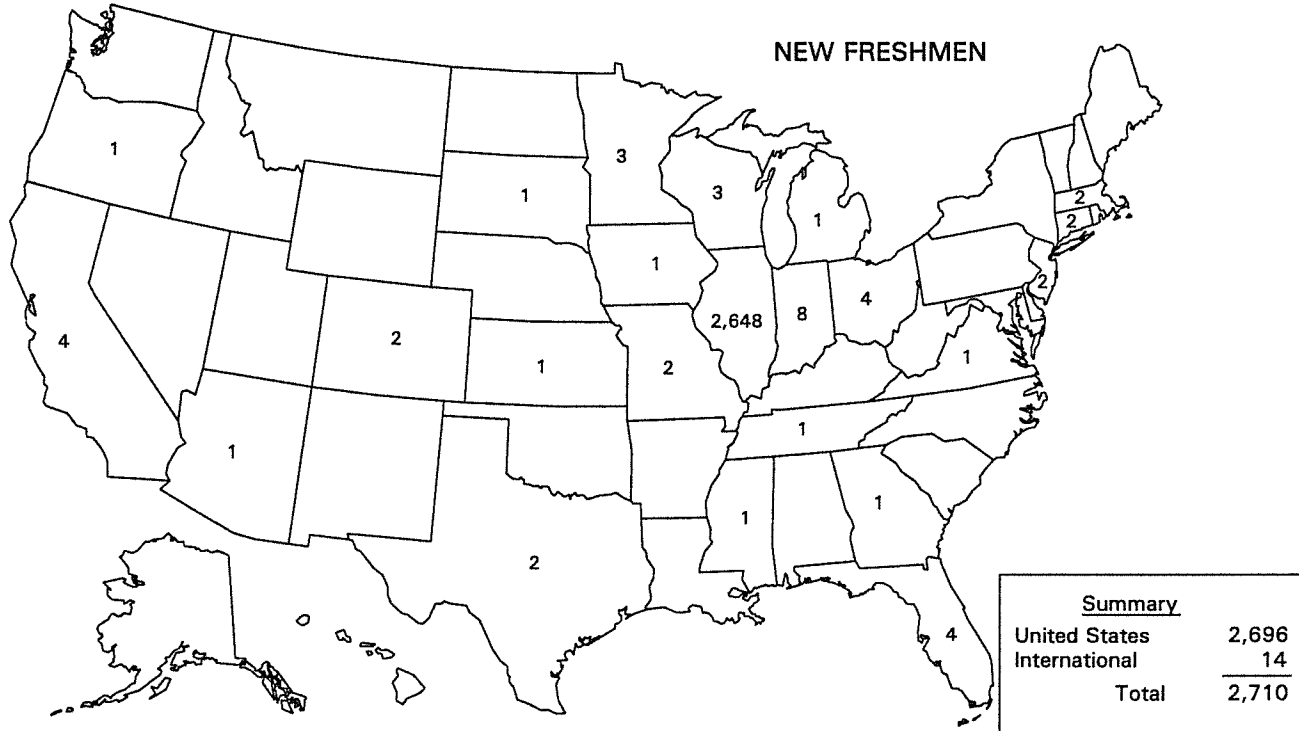

Academic Performance

HIGHLIGHTS

- *Retention, the combination of graduated and still enrolled, illustrates attendance patterns at UIC. While 28 percent graduated, 21 percent of the 1987 freshman cohort remained enrolled in the fifth year. As shown in Table 17, the five-year retention rate increased from 33 percent for the 1980 cohort to 49 percent for the 1987 cohort.*
- *First-time transfers who matriculated to UIC in fall 1980 were tracked for eight years following transfer as shown in Table 18. By the end of the fourth year, 26 percent graduated and by the end of the eighth year, 33 percent graduated. Retention rates have increased with the cohorts which followed the 1980 cohort, but these data illustrate the extended time taken for transfers to earn degrees at UIC.*
- *Retention rates for the fall 1984 transfer students are reported in Table 19. At UIC about half of the transfer students enter at the freshmen or sophomore class level. Two years after enrolling, 6 percent of the 1984 community college transfers and 10 percent of the four-year college transfers graduated, and over one-third of each of the groups were still enrolled. These rates are slightly below the four-year retention rates for the fall 1984 beginning freshman cohort.*

Fall Beginning Freshmen include full-time freshmen entering in the summer preceding the fall term. Summer degrees are counted with the subsequent fall. Enrollment figures are given for the percentage enrolled through that year. Year two, and so on, reflects the number of students enrolled through the second year and the number of degrees conferred during that year. These data might incur rounding error.

Table 17 reports enrollment, graduation and retention patterns for fall 1980 to fall 1987 beginning freshmen cohorts. Retention percentages include students who have graduated during the year or are still enrolled at the end of the academic year. For example, of those freshmen who entered UIC in fall 1984, 2.8 percent were still enrolled and 37.3 had graduated after eight years, to yield a retention rate of 40.0 percent.

In fall 1980, 3,151 students enrolled as beginning freshmen and eight years later, 831 or 26.2 percent of those freshmen had received their baccalaureate degrees. The eight-year graduation rate of the 1980 cohort contrasts sharply with those of the 1983 and 1984 cohorts, 38.0 and 37.3 respectively. The mean ACT: Composite score for the 1984 cohort was 20.1 compared to around 18.0 for the 1980 cohort.

UIC Beginning Freshmen Retention Patterns for 1984 Cohort

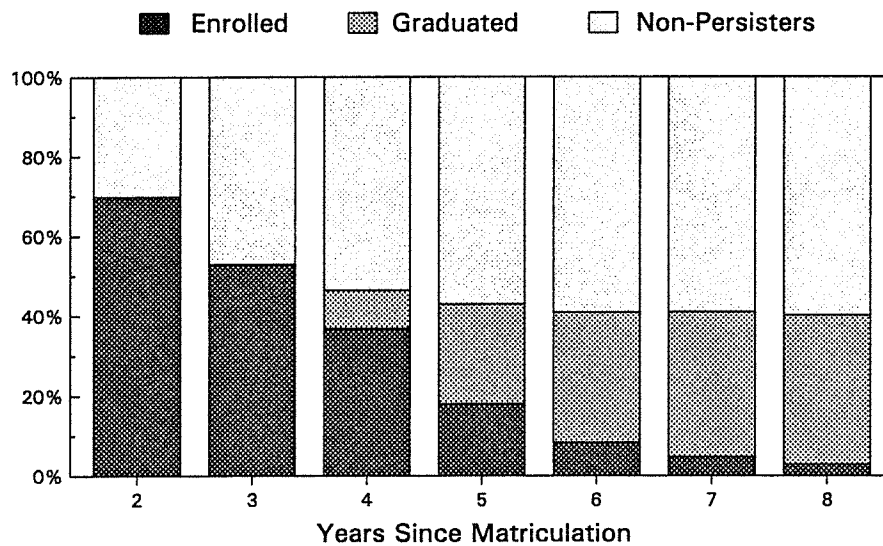

Fall 1980 Transfer Cohort**

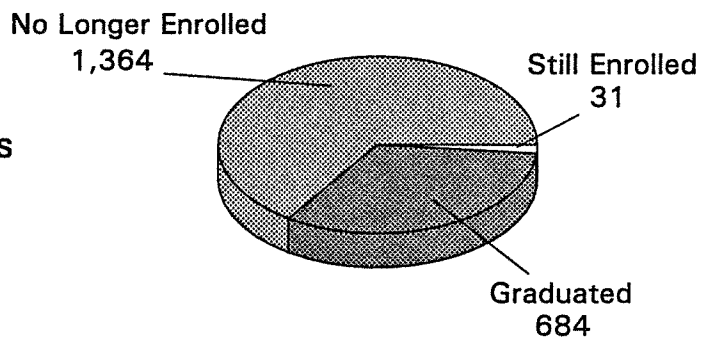

Table 18 reports cumulative graduation rates for first-time transfers who matriculated to UIC in fall 1980. This cohort was tracked for eight years after transferring. In fall 1980, 2,079 new transfers entered UIC. Of the initial transfer cohort, 26 percent graduated by the fourth year and 33 percent by the eighth year after matriculation. Although the graduation rate has increased since the cohorts of the early eighties, this display illustrates the long attendance patterns of UIC students.

Table 19 reports enrollment, graduation, and retention rates for community college and four-year transfers who matriculated to UIC in fall 1984. This cohort was tracked for two years after transfer.

In fall 1984, 1,445 new students transferred from community colleges to UIC. Two years later 38 percent were enrolled and six percent had graduated. From four-year colleges, 1,201 new students transferred to UIC with 35 percent still enrolled and 10 percent graduated after two years.

Degrees Conferred UIC

HIGHLIGHTS

- *In FY 1993, the campus conferred 4,678 degrees. Though this number is lower than FY 1992, the highest numbers of the ten-year period occurred in FY 1991 and FY 1992. See Table 20. Degrees granted have increased substantially at the master's and doctorate level since the mid-eighties with master's degrees increasing by 30 percent and doctorates doubling in number.*
- *Table 21 displays the number of undergraduate degrees conferred by college since 1984. The number of degrees granted varies in most colleges from year to year, but most colleges show decreases this year from the highs of the last two years. The number of degrees conferred in the largest college, Liberal Arts and Sciences, moved between 900 and 1,200 baccalaureate degrees during the ten-year period.*
- *Table 22 reports degrees conferred by level by gender in FY 1993. Females account for 51 percent of the undergraduate degrees, 58 percent of the master's, and 40 percent of doctorate and professional degrees.*
- *Tables 23 and 23.1 report the number and percent of FY 1993 degrees conferred by race/ethnicity. Overall, 63 percent of degrees were granted to White students compared to 67 percent in FY 1990. The largest change has occurred at the undergraduate level. In FY 1990, 13 percent of baccalaureate degrees were conferred to Black and Hispanic students compared to 17 percent in FY 1993. At most institutions, minority student representation decreases as the level of degree increases; however, in FY 1993 at UIC, Hispanic students earned over 8 percent of the degrees at both the bachelor's and professional level.*

by Level -- FY 1984 and FY 1993

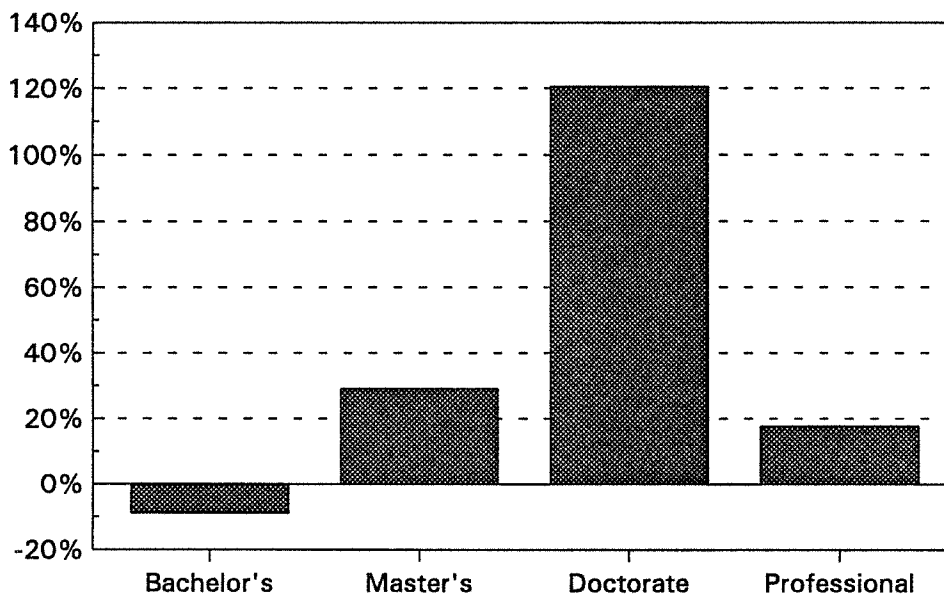

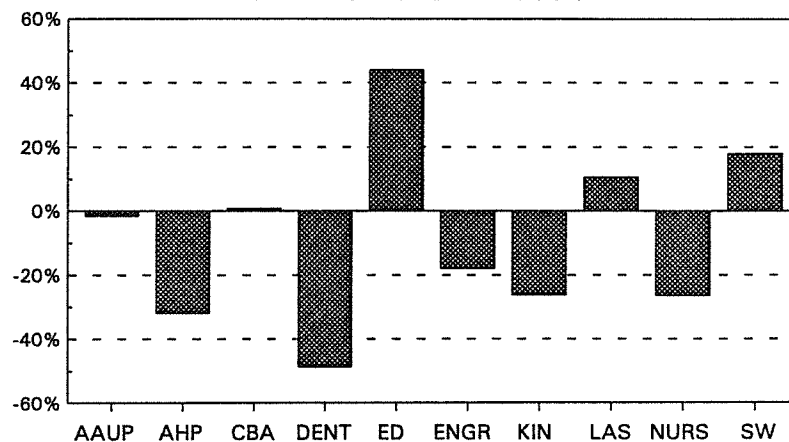

by Gender -- FY 1993**

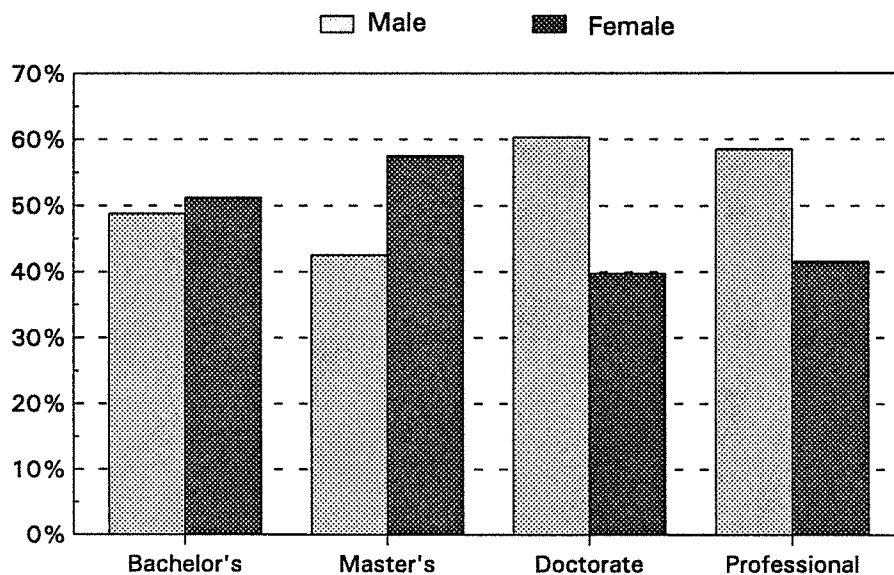

HIGHLIGHTS

- *During the past ten years, total enrollment on the Urbana campus has been stable, varying from 34,500 to 36,500. Fall 1993 total enrollment is 36,440. Graduate enrollment increased throughout the period, moving from 22 percent of the total in 1983 to 25 percent in 1993.*
- *Throughout the period, new freshmen composed approximately 20 percent of undergraduate enrollment and new transfers, 4 to 7 percent (Table 25). More new freshmen and transfers were admitted this year than last, and subsequently enrollment levels are higher in Fall 1993.*
- *Fall 1993 undergraduate enrollment is lower in five colleges and higher in the other five colleges when compared to fall 1983. Table 27 displays 1993 graduate enrollment by college by level by gender. The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the College of Engineering enroll the highest numbers of graduate students.*
- *Figures 23, 24, and 25 illustrate trends in enrollment by gender. Males continue to represent the majority of the undergraduate and graduate populations. However, the professional student cohort has moved from a nearly 2:1 male to female ratio to almost 1:1 in the last ten years.*
- *The racial/ethnic diversity of the undergraduate population increased significantly during the past decade with Black students moving from 3.9 percent of the total to 7.0 percent and Hispanic students from 1.8 to 5.3 percent. The number of Illinois Black high school graduates declined during the past several years, but intensive recruitment helped maintain the proportion of Black enrollees. Professional Black student enrollment percentages increased substantially since the late eighties, moving from 2.9 to 7.6 percent of the total. Hispanic professional enrollment also increased from a 1.4 to 3.9 percent distribution. See Tables 29-30 and Figures 26-28.*
- *The maps in Figure 29 illustrate the geographical origin of undergraduate and graduate/professional populations. While the graduate/professional cohort represents a wider geographic distribution, 92 percent of undergraduates are Illinois residents.*
- *The geographic origin of international students is displayed in Table 31. Over 86 percent of the international students enroll at the graduate level.*

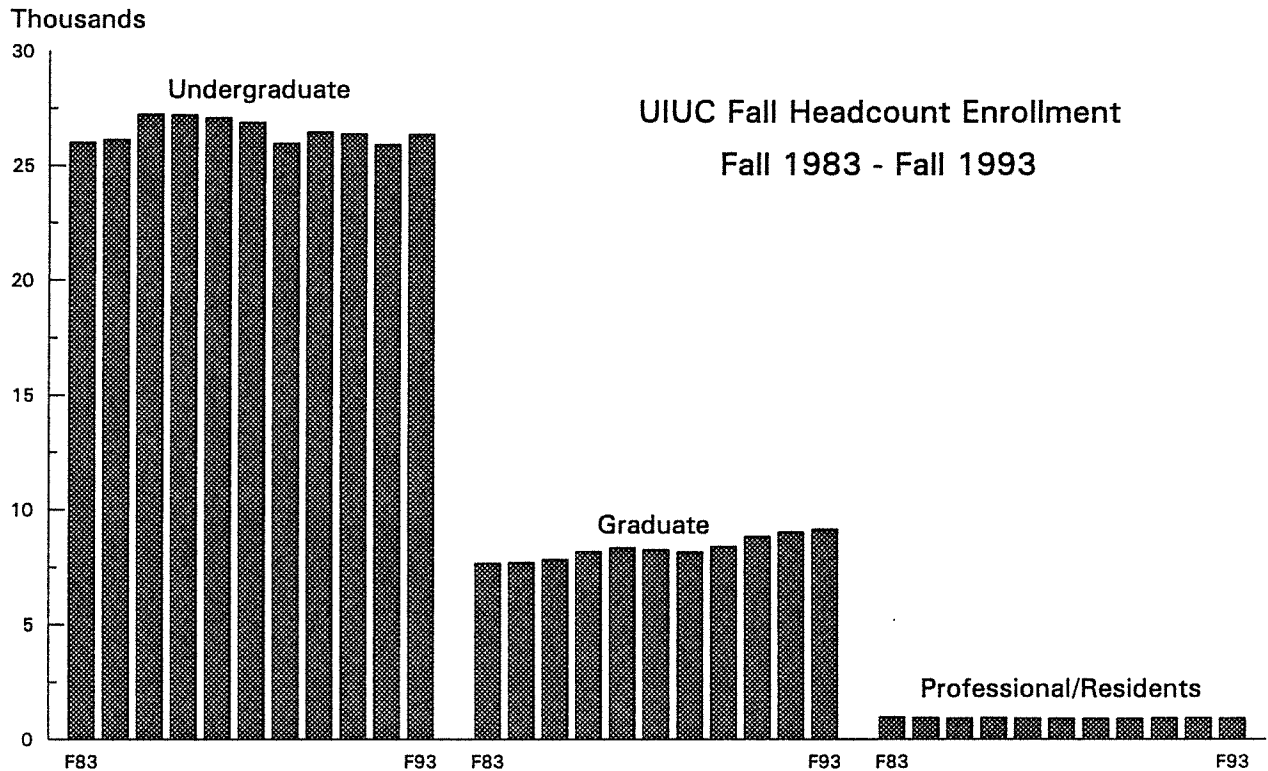

Fall 1983 - Fall 1993

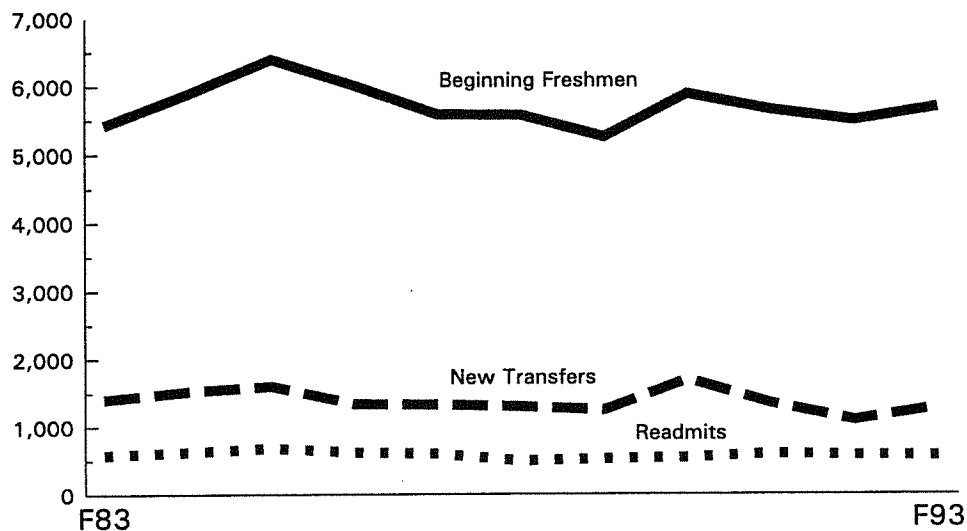

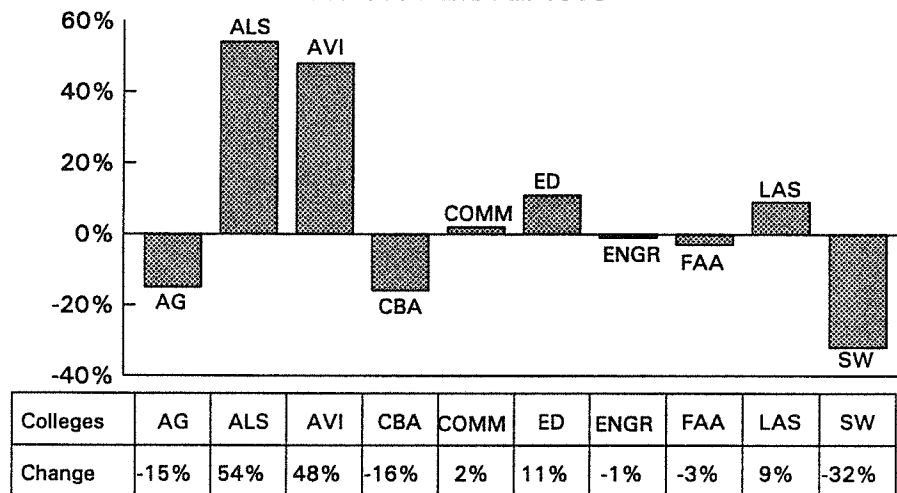

Fall 1983 - Fall 1993

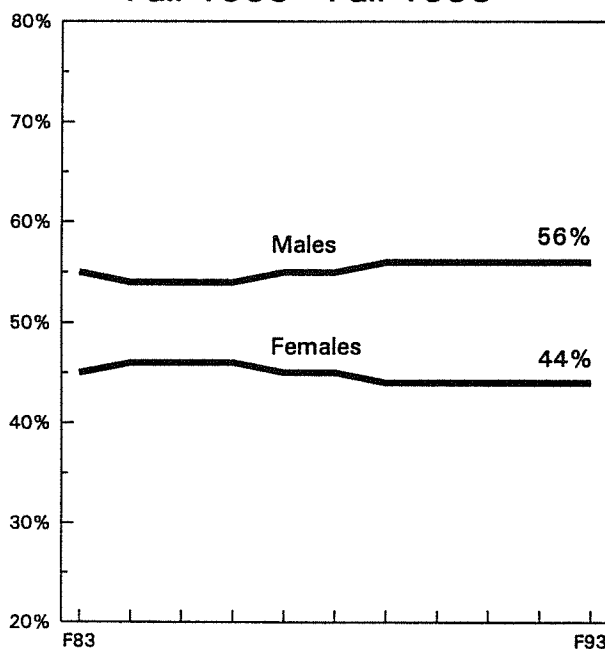

Fall 1983 - Fall 1993

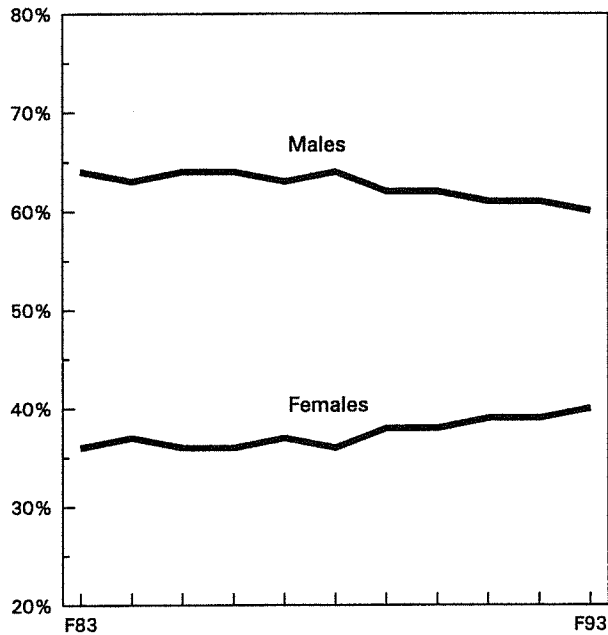

Fall 1983 - Fall 1993

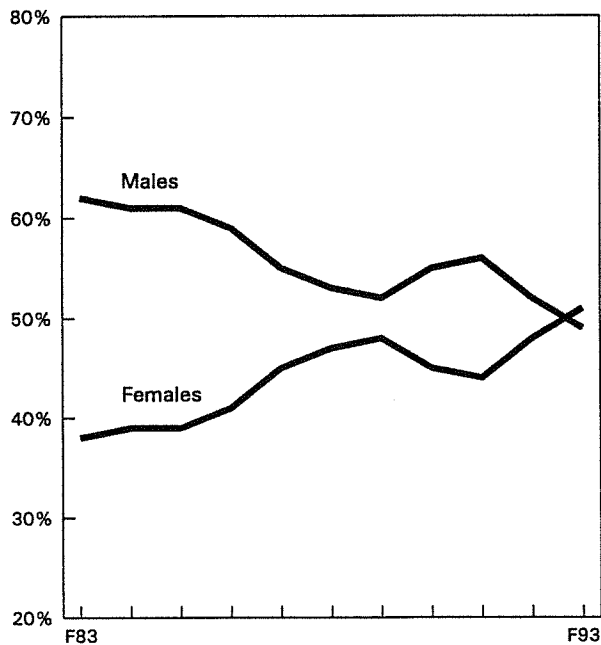

UIUC Undergraduate Minority Enrollment As a Percentage of Total Undergraduate Enrollment Fall 1983 - Fall 1993

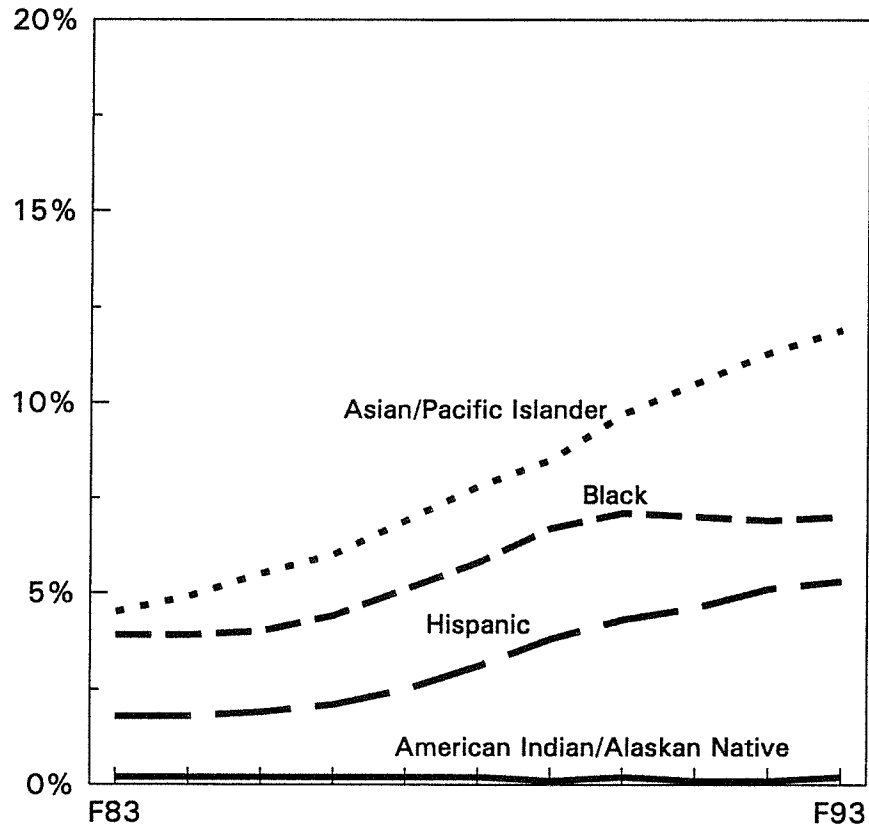

Fall 1983 - Fall 1993

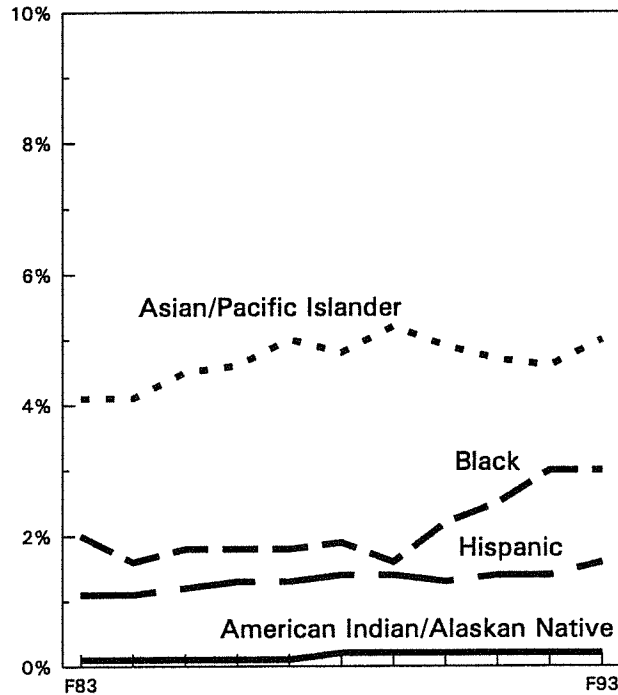

Fall 1983 - Fall 1993

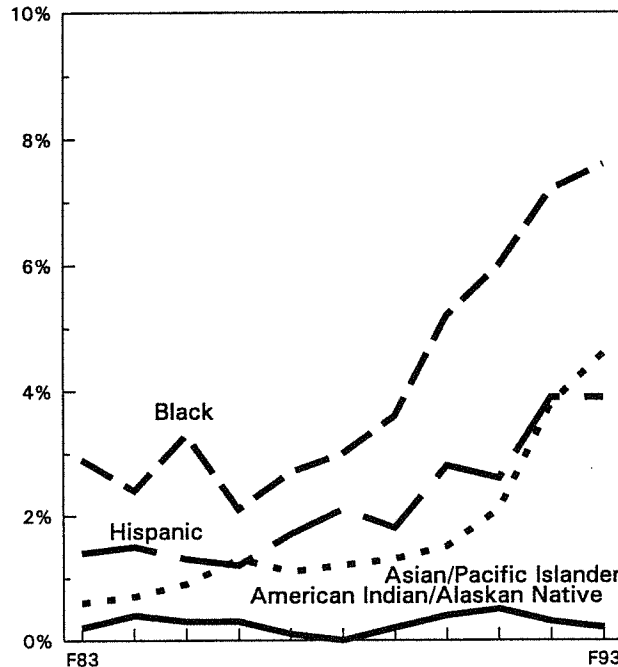

FALL 1993

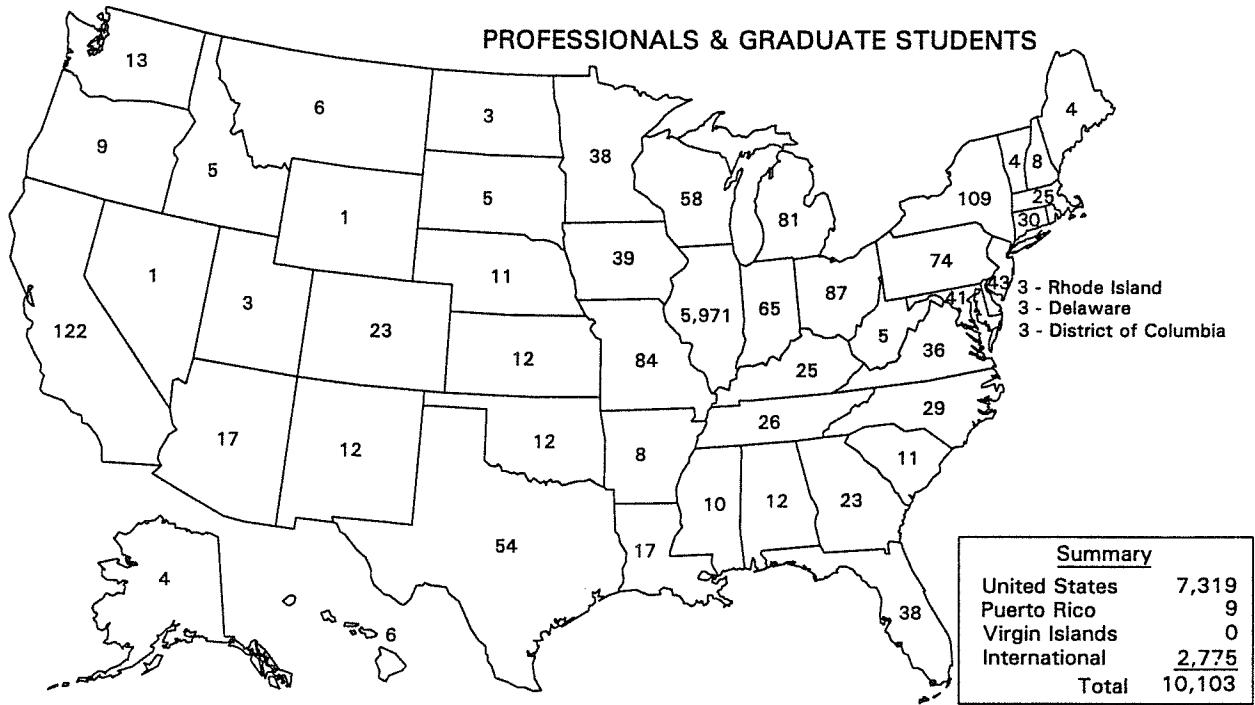
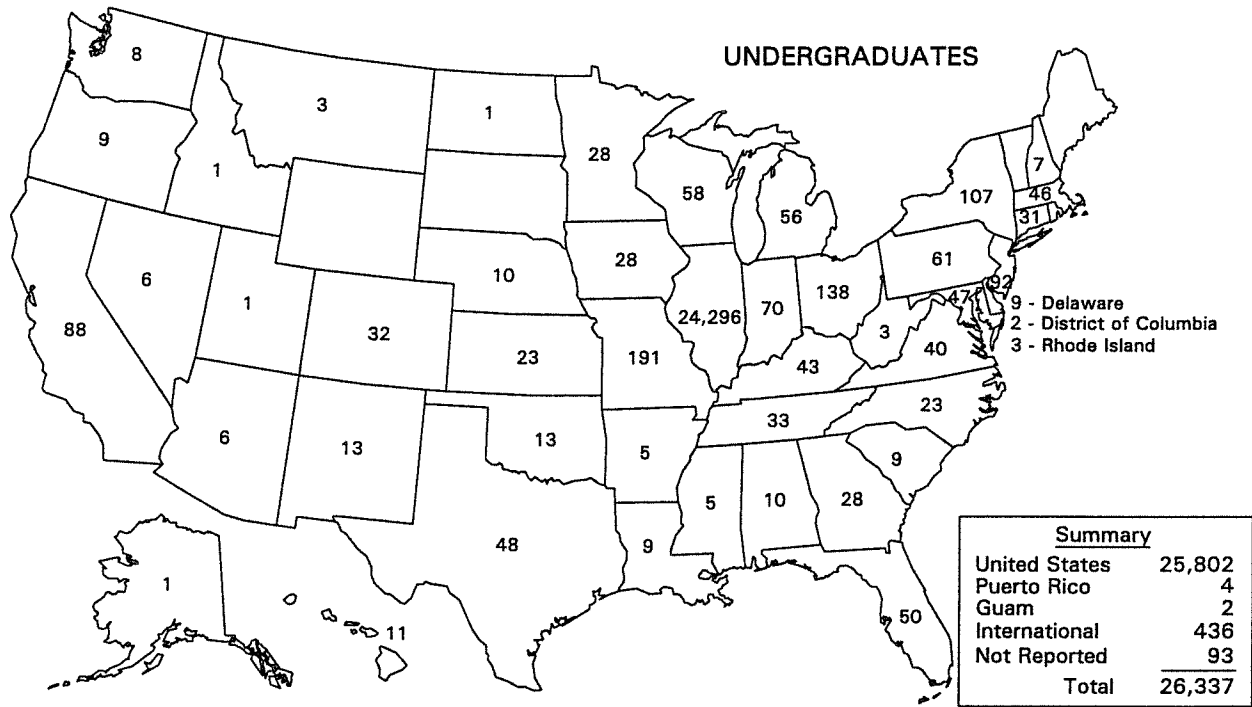

New Student Characteristics

HIGHLIGHTS

- *The total number of beginning freshmen at UIUC ranged from about 5,250 to 6,400 students in the last ten years. In fall 1993, 5,696 beginning freshmen enrolled compared to 5,500 in 1992 and 5,424 in 1983. See Table 32.*
- *Beginning freshman enrollment by college is lower in two colleges in 1993 than 1983 with variation in the intervening years. The largest college, Liberal Arts and Sciences, enrolled a high of 3,130 new freshmen in 1985, a low of 2,426 in 1989, and 2,687 students in 1993.*
- *New transfer enrollments are higher in 1993 than in 1992, but 8.3 percent fewer than a decade ago. The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences enrolls over one-third of all new transfer students and Engineering about one-fifth.*
- *UIUC continues to attract top high school graduates, as illustrated in Tables 34 and 35. As in years past, nearly 90 percent of the UIUC new freshman students placed in the upper quartile of their respective high school classes, and over half received an ACT score of 27 or above.*
- *Tables 36-38 present selected demographics of the fall 1993 new students. The geographic characteristics such as origin, residency, and transfer institution are mapped in Figures 32-34. The Chicago metropolitan area provides the largest numbers of beginning freshmen to UIUC; however, several downstate counties--Champaign, Peoria, St. Clair, and Sangamon--also are large feeder counties. The 1993 freshman class is composed of slightly more out-of-state and international students than in the past. Parkland Community College and the College of DuPage send the largest numbers of transfers to UIUC.*

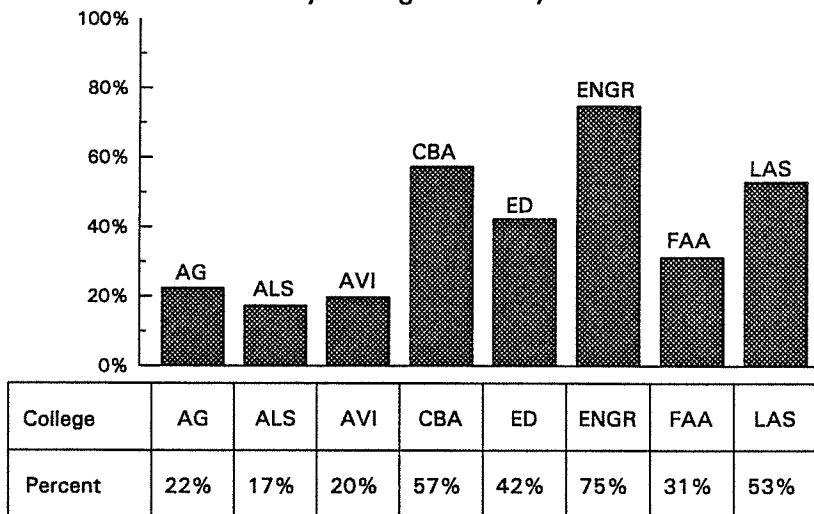

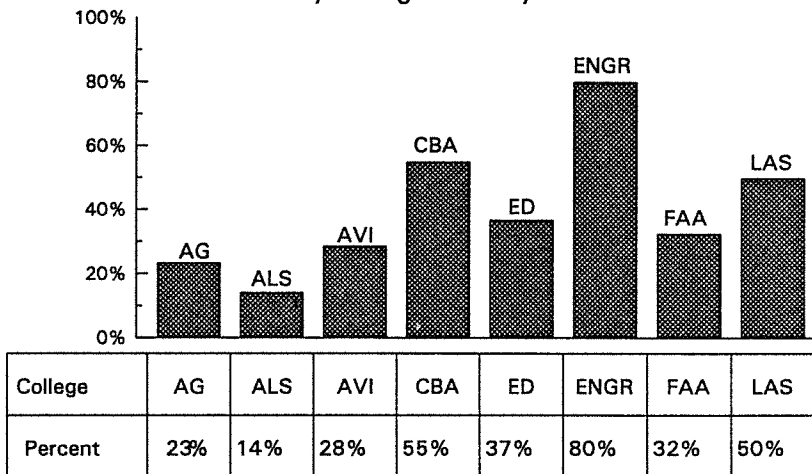

In October 1989, the American College Testing Program (ACT) introduced the Enhanced ACT Assessment. This test, usually taken by high school juniors and seniors, was similar but not identical to the previously used Assessment instrument. Because changes in the new test yielded differences in the scoring distribution, scores on the two tests are NOT interchangeable. ACT has published concordance tables which show scores on the former test to be equivalent to a higher score on the Enhanced Test. To convert the former score to an equivalent Enhanced score, the rule of thumb at the upper end is to add one (1) to the former test score and on the lower end to add anywhere from three to five points to the former score. Recent average scores for Illinois test takers are reported above in order to better compare the composite means.

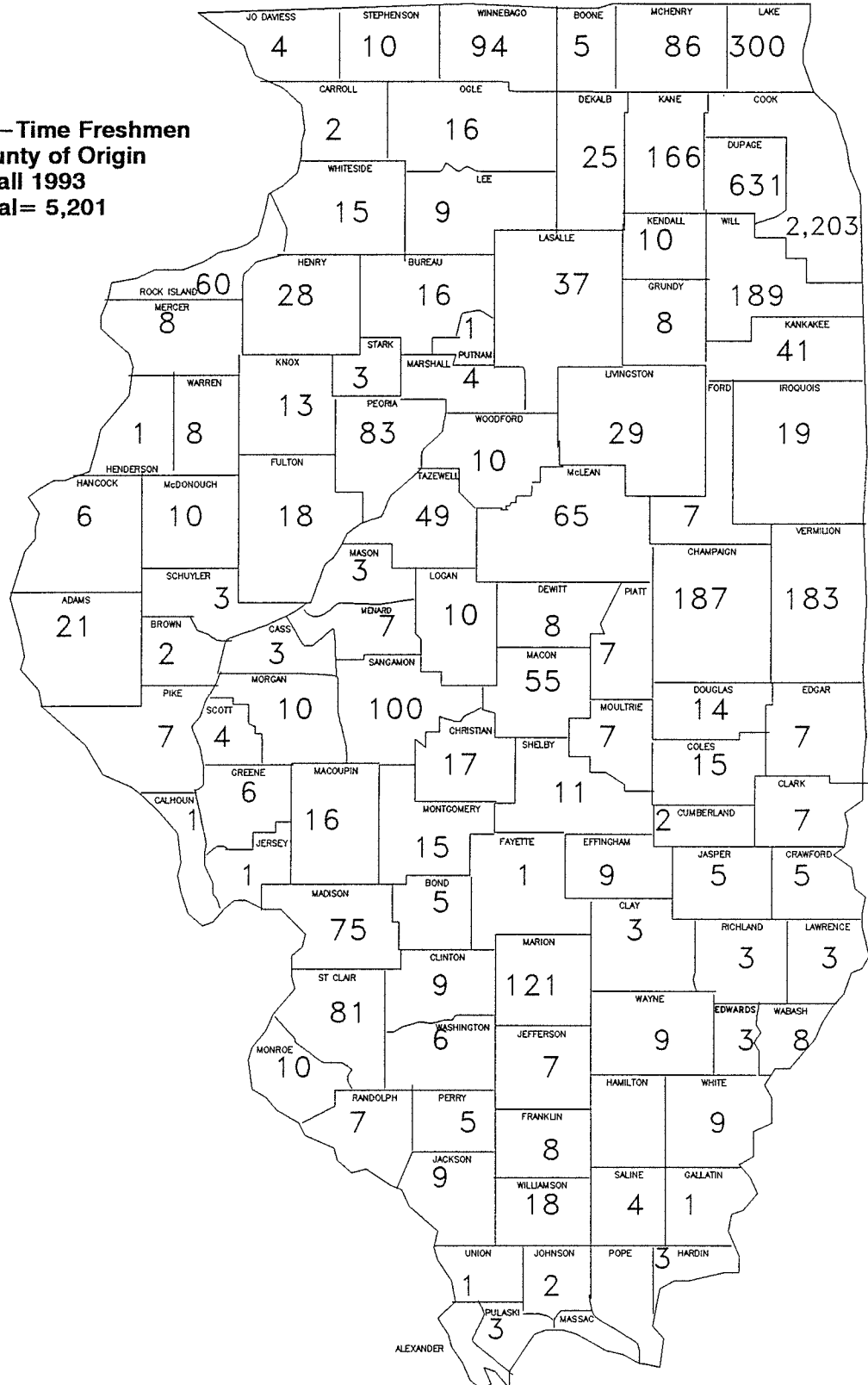

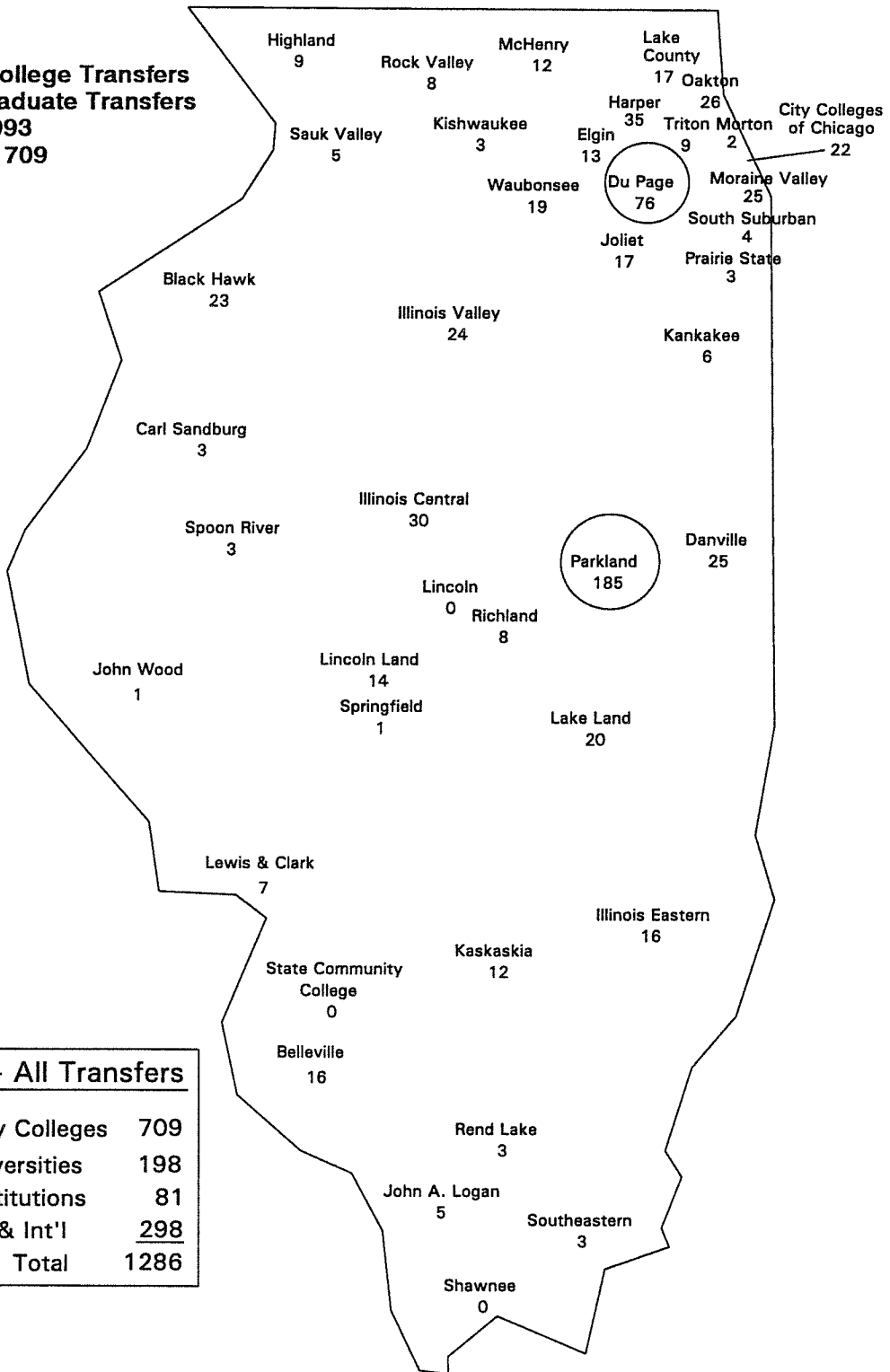
**UIUC First–Time Freshmen

FALL 1993

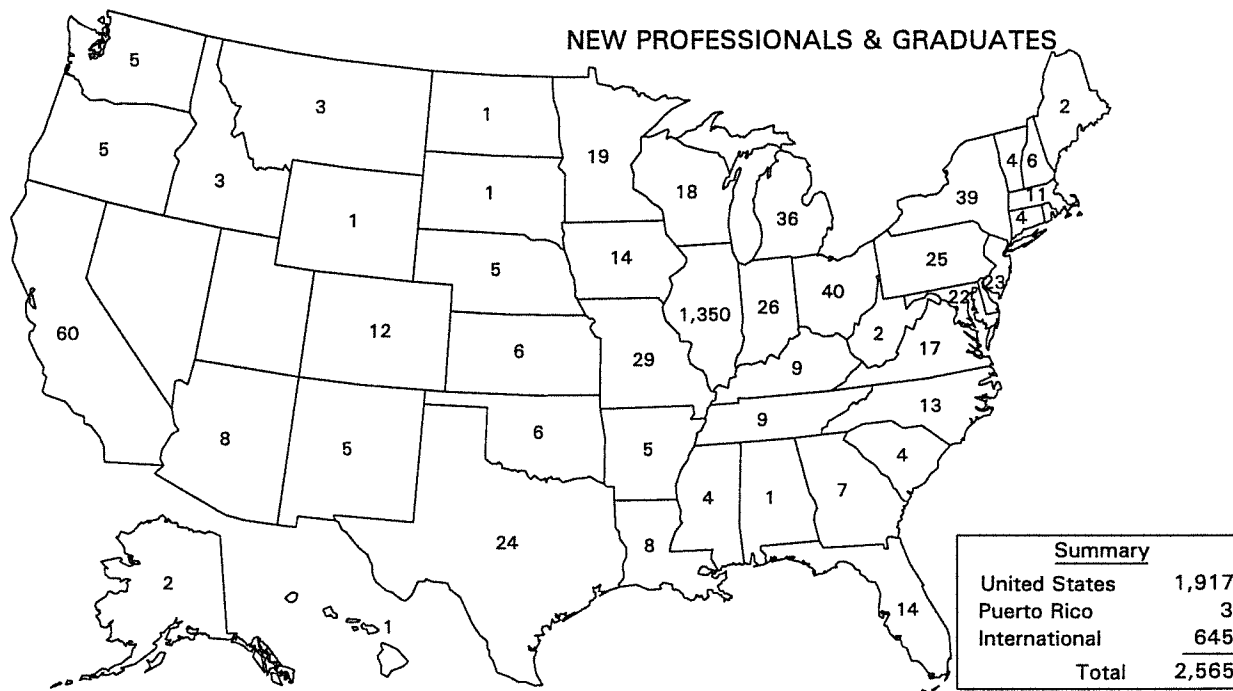
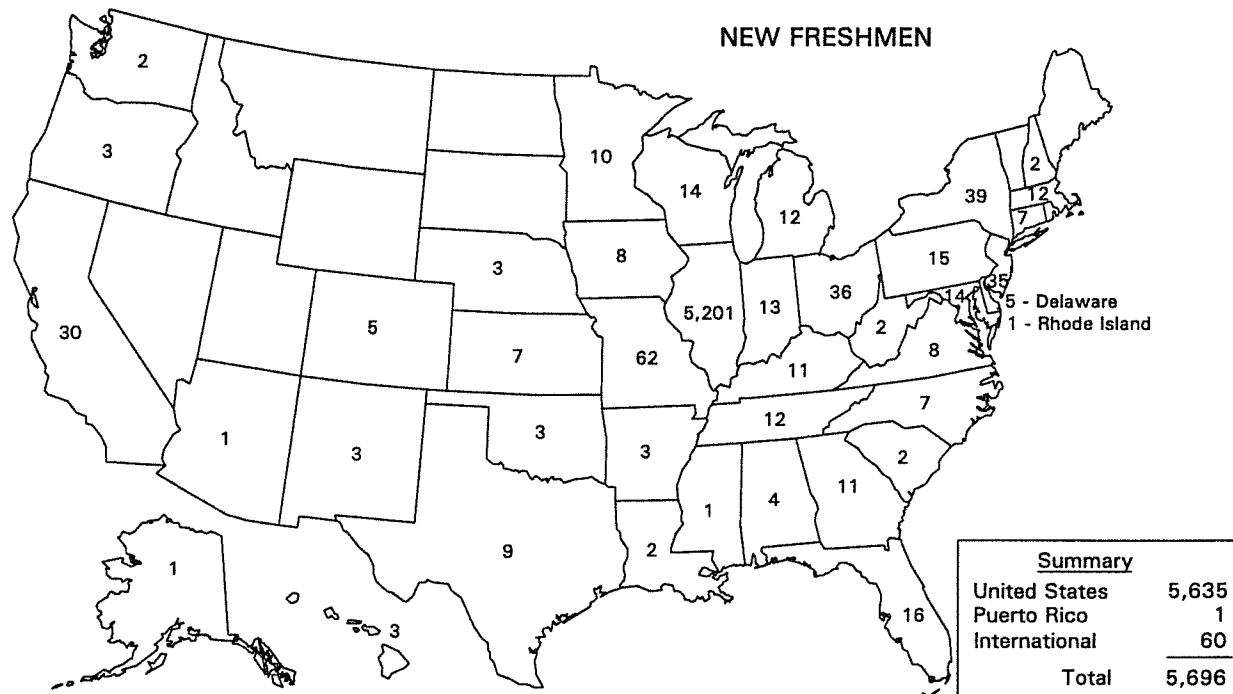

HIGHLIGHTS

- *One-year retention rates by college are reported in Table 39. Overall, 91 percent of the freshman class was still enrolled on clear or probationary status at the end of their first year.*
- *Table 40 tracks the mean grade point averages for the 1987 transfers from community colleges and four-year institutions for six semesters after transfer. The community college transfers dropped over one-half of a grade point the first semester, but the group average improved steadily in the succeeding terms.*
- *Graduation and retention patterns are reported in Tables 41 and 42 for beginning freshmen and transfers. The graduation rate after eight years for freshmen ranges from 75 percent for the fall 1980 group to nearly 80 percent for the later cohorts. For transfers, the graduation rate for the fall 1987 cohort was 69 percent after three years with nearly 10 percent still enrolled.*

Fall 1992 Cohort

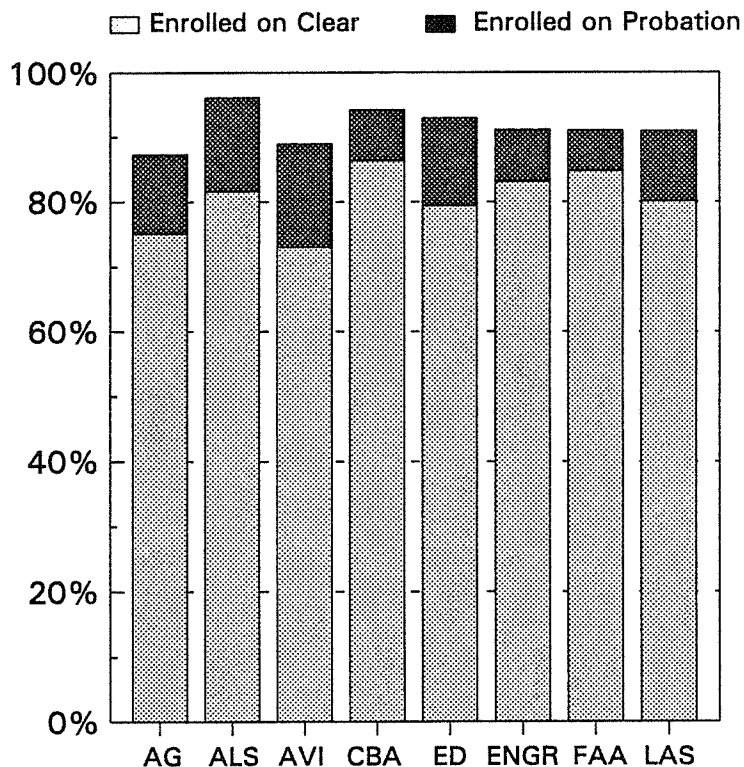

Reported above are enrollments and mean cumulative grade point averages for the fall 1987 cohort of new transfers to UIUC. This cohort was tracked for three years after transfer.

In fall 1987, 741 students from community colleges transferred to UIUC entering with a mean cumulative GPA of 4.26. After one semester, the mean GPA for this cohort dropped to 3.72. At the end of four semesters, or two years after transfer, the mean GPA for this cohort had increased to 3.97. Retention and graduation rates for this cohort are reported in Table 42 which shows that by the end of the fifth term, over fifty percent had graduated.

In fall 1987, 466 students from four—year colleges and universities transferred to UIUC entering with a mean cumulative GPA of 4.15. At the end of one semester, this cohort's mean GPA dropped to 3.86, a smaller decrease than experienced by the community college cohort. At the end of four semesters, or two years after transfer, the mean GPA for this cohort increased to 4.08. Retention and graduation rates for this cohort are also reported in Table 42.

Fall beginning freshmen include full-time freshmen entering in the summer preceding the fall term. Summer degrees are counted with the subsequent fall. Enrollment figures are given for the percentage enrolled through that year. Year two, and so on, reflects the number of students enrolled through the second year and the number of degrees conferred during that year. All percents are cumulative percents for each entering fall term. These data might incur rounding error.

Table 41 reports enrollment, graduation and retention patterns for fall 1980 to fall 1987 beginning freshmen cohorts. Retention percentages include students who have graduated during the year or are still enrolled at the end of the academic year. For example, of those freshmen who entered UIUC in fall 1984, less than one percent were still enrolled and almost 80 percent had graduated after eight years, to yield a retention rate of just over 80 percent.

This Data Book presents data revised from previous Data Books. In fall 1980, 5,859 students enrolled as beginning freshmen and eight years later 74.9 percent of those students had received their baccalaureate degrees. The highest eight year graduation rate is reported for the fall 1984 beginning freshman cohort with a 79.8 percent graduation rate.

UIUC Beginning Freshmen Retention Patterns for 1984 Cohort

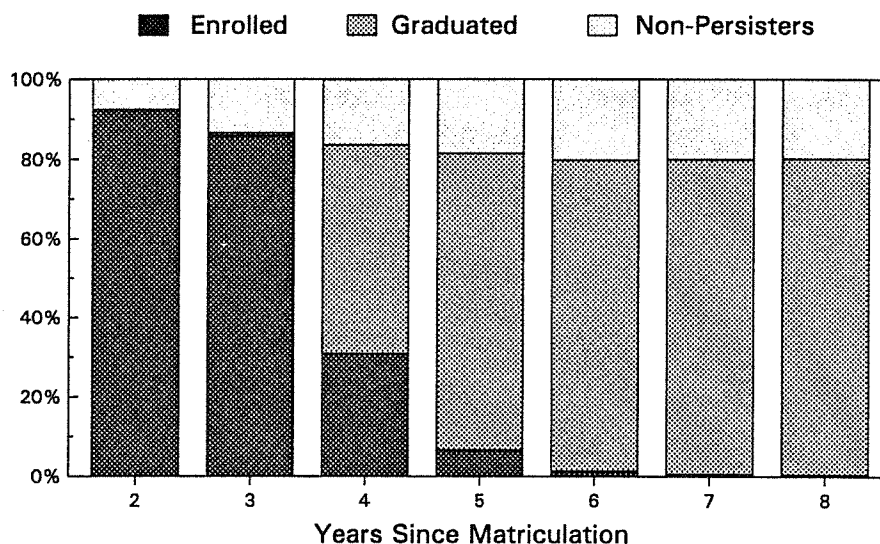

The above tables report cumulative enrollment, graduation, and retention rates for community college and four-year transfers who matriculated to UIUC in fall 1987. This cohort was tracked for three years after transfer.

In fall 1987, 741 new students transferred from community colleges to UIUC. Of that initial cohort, 508 students graduated after six semesters representing a graduation rate of 68.6 percent. From four-year colleges 466 new students transferred to UIUC and 319 (68.5 percent) graduated after three years. Compared to beginning freshmen five years after matriculation, transfer cohorts graduate at slightly lower rates but are still enrolled at slightly higher rates.

Degrees Conferred UIUC

HIGHLIGHTS

- *In FY 1993, the campus conferred approximately 4 percent more total degrees than in FY 1984, but 4 percent fewer than in FY 1992--the highest number in the period reported. The number of master's degrees increased sharply in 1992 and then increased further in 1993.*
- *As presented in Table 44, most of the larger colleges conferred fewer baccalaureate degrees in FY 1993 than in the mid-eighties. The exception is the largest college, Liberal Arts & Sciences, which granted over 20% more degrees than in FY 1984.*
- *When comparing undergraduate degrees conferred by gender from FY 1984 to FY 1993, the distribution of female students moved from 42 percent to 44 percent. See Table 45.*
- *Tables 46 and 46.1 report undergraduate degrees conferred by race/ethnicity. The percentage distribution of undergraduate degrees conferred to minority students has substantially increased in the last ten years. The proportion of degrees conferred to Black, Hispanic, and Asian students has more than doubled since 1984, while degrees to White students have declined from 91 percent to 81 percent of the total.*

by Level -- FY 1984 and FY 1993**

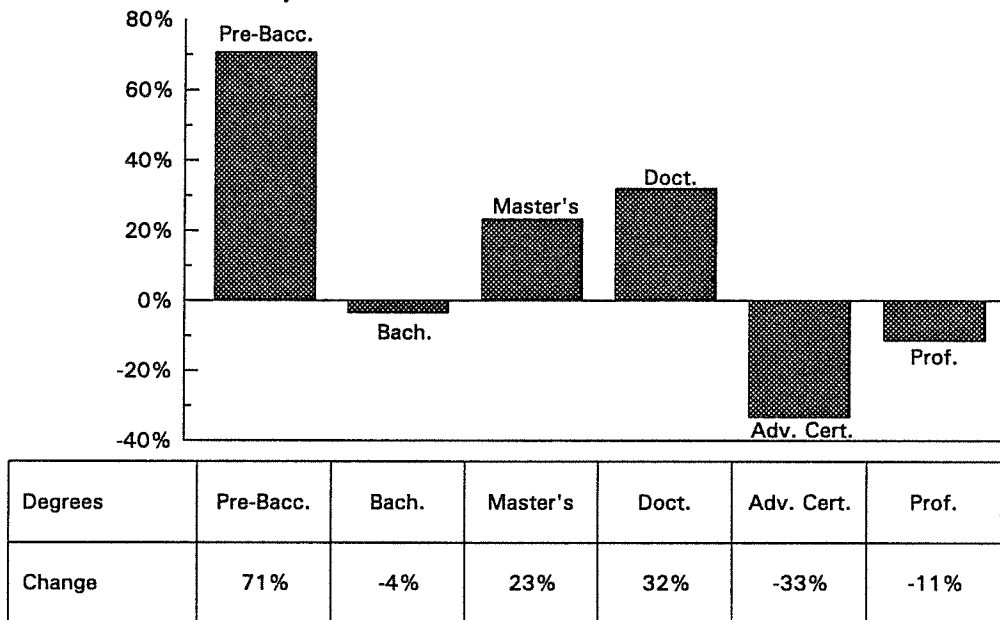

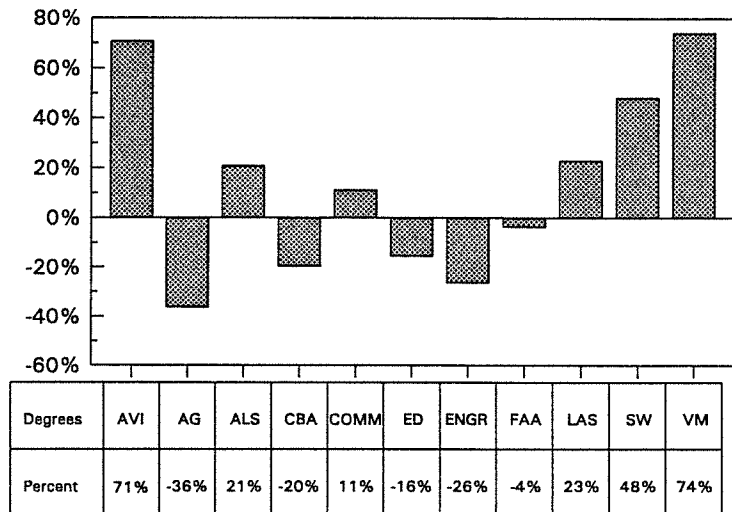
