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EXPLANATORY NOTES FOR RETENTION AND GRADUATION

Graduation and retention rates are the result of many variables including academic performance, academic preparation, motivation, and academic integration. Other factors which seem to influence graduation and retention include part/full-time attendance, student age, family responsibilities, commuter/resident attendance, first-generation college attendance, socioeconomic status, employment, and indebtedness. The extent to which these factors combine and contribute to graduation and retention is not fully understood, but there is a considerable body of research which has documented the complexities of the issue.

Throughout recent history the graduation rate of students in the United States who enter a university as beginning freshmen and earn bachelor's degrees from that same university four to six years later is approximately 50 percent. A freshman class with higher average ability, motivation, preparation, greater full-time attendance, etc. will graduate at higher rates than that average. The reverse is also true.

However, there are no hard and fast prediction models. The intervening variables are numerous and interrelated. For example, high motivation certainly can overcome under-preparedness just as low motivation can negate high ability. Better academic preparation may be the result of high academic ability or the consequence of higher socioeconomic status and thus a more positive high school environment.

It is tempting to compare institution-wide graduation rates among universities without accounting for the makeup of the student body. The reader is cautioned not to make blanket comparisons, for example, in the graduation and retention rates provided in this Data Book for the University of Illinois campuses. The student bodies of the campuses are different, and thus comparisons among the three would parallel the customary apples-to-oranges relationship.

One other caveat should be emphasized: Retention data presented in this and in previous Data Books were gathered from several different studies, each employing slightly different methodologies. The footnotes section of each table describes the definitions used for that table.

EXPLANATORY NOTES FOR CHICAGO STUDENT DATA

In 1986 the Health Sciences Center campus and the University Center campus merged and became the University of Illinois at Chicago. To provide consistency in reporting enrollment data, figures for 1985 and 1986 have been adjusted to reflect this merger.

In 1984 UIC initiated a Pharmacy Doctorate Program at the professional level. Students in this program were formerly included in the undergraduate pharmacy enrollment totals. Due to this change in classification, students entering the Pharmacy Doctorate Program in 1985 and 1986 were subtracted from the undergraduate enrollment totals reported in the Enrollment Tables produced by the University Office for Academic Policy Analysis. This explains the increases in Professional enrollments for 1985 and 1986.

In 1993 the College of Kinesiology became a part of the College of Associated Health Professions. When comparisons are made between years, the data for the two colleges are combined.

In 1995 the College of Architecture, Arts, and Urban Planning changed to Architecture and the Arts. Urban Planning became part of Urban Policy and Public Affairs in the Graduate College.

Current and historical enrollment data for UIC were gathered from five sources: 1) Office of Data Resources and Institutional Analysis (DRIA), 2) the Student Data Book which is produced by DRIA, 3) the Enrollment Tables produced by the University Office for Academic Policy Analysis, 4) Integrated Post-Secondary Education Data System (IPEDS), reported by the University of Illinois to the Illinois Board of Higher Education, and 5) the University Student Research Data Base (RDB). Historical data were consistent in almost all instances; however, when discrepancies occurred, enrollment figures reported in the Enrollment Tables were used. Current data were taken from the University Student Research Data Base.


Campus Enrollments UIC

HIGHLIGHTS

- During the past ten years, total enrollment on the Chicago campus was stable, though down slightly from last fall. As Figure 1 illustrates, graduate enrollment decreased since a high in 1993 while undergraduate enrollment varied little over the last ten years. Enrollment at the professional level is at the highest point in the period.
- As indicated in Table 2, the number of beginning freshmen declined from the high point of the last ten years, fall 1993. Transfer and readmitted students are at a lower number and make up a smaller proportion of new students than in previous years. Continuing students in 1995 are at a higher number than in 1985 and constitute a larger percentage of the student body.
- Five out of eight colleges experienced increases in undergraduate enrollments since 1985, although levels fluctuated in the intervening years. The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, enrolling more undergraduates than all other colleges combined, has returned to a lower enrollment after 1993, the highest level of the period.
- Graduate II enrollment, generally doctoral candidates, increased from approximately 1,450 students in 1987 and 1988 to 1,835 in 1995.
- Figures 4-6 illustrate trends in undergraduate, graduate, and professional enrollment by gender. For the third year in a row, there are more females than males at the undergraduate level.
- Enrollment at UIC is more diverse in race/ethnicity in fall 1995 than in fall 1985. Figure 8 illustrates that, as a percent of all undergraduates, Hispanic and Asian/Pacific Islander enrollment has risen substantially. Black enrollment has fallen though the change is less than a one percentage point difference. At the graduate level, the proportion of Black, Hispanic, and Asian/Pacific Islander students steadily increased since 1990.
- The maps in Figure 10 illustrate geographic residency. While the graduate/ professional cohort represents a wider geographic distribution, over 96 percent of undergraduates are Illinois residents.
- The geographic origin of international students is displayed in Table 9. Most international students enroll at the graduate level.





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





GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION OF UIC STUDENT RESIDENCY FALL 1995



New Student Characteristics UIC

HIGHLIGHTS

- Table 10 indicates that beginning freshman enrollment decreased the last two years from 1993, the highest point in the ten-year period. Generally, enrollment change over the ten-year period is attributable to decreases in the College of Business Administration and Engineering and increases in Liberal Arts and Sciences. These patterns reflect nationwide trends in enrollment.
- In the last ten years, new transfer enrollment decreased from a high of over 2,570 to the current enrollment of 1,957 transfer students, the lowest number in ten years. Over half of all transfers enrolled in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. See Table 11.
- The mean high school percentile rank of beginning freshmen has increased for the last four years (Table 12) and the average American College Test (ACT) composite score is one-half a point higher in 1995 than last year (Table 13). Because of a change from ACT to the Enhanced ACT tests, a comparison of the scores cannot be made across the ten-year period.
- Chicago continues to be the main source of new students--supplying over half of the UIC new freshman and transfer
 enrollment. Likewise, Illinois residents comprise over three
 quarters of new graduate and professional students. Tables 1416 present selected demographics of the fall 1995 beginning
 students, and geographic characteristics such as origin,
 residency, and transfer institution are mapped in Figures 12-14.



To convert the former score to an equivalent Enhanced score, the rule of thumb at the upper end is to add one (1) to the former test score and on the lower end to add anywhere from three to five points to the former score. Recent average scores for Illinois test takers are reported above in order to better compare the composite means.





GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION OF UIC NEW STUDENT RESIDENCY FALL 1995



Academic Performance UIC

HIGHLIGHTS

- Retention, the combination of graduated and still enrolled students, illustrates attendance patterns at UIC. While 28 percent graduated, 21 percent of the 1987 freshman cohort were still enrolled in the fifth year. In the seventh year, graduated and enrolled were 40 percent and 5 percent, respectively. See Table 17.
 - Also shown in Table 17, the five-year retention rate increased from 33 percent for the 1980 cohort to 49 percent for the 1987 cohort.
- The six-year retention rate of Hispanic and White students in the 1987 cohort is comparable at just above 40 percent. Black student retention is about ten percentage points lower, but greatly improved from earlier cohorts. Asian students succeed at the highest rate-approximately 50 percent enrolled or graduated after six years.
- First-time transfers who matriculated to UIC in fall 1980 and 1989 were tracked for eight and five years, respectively, following transfer as shown in Table 18. In the 1980 cohort, 33 percent graduated and in the 1989 cohort, 44 percent graduated.
- The data in Table 18 for the 1985 and 1989 cohorts are broken down by class level in Table 19. Students who transfer as juniors show higher graduation and retention rates than any other class--20 percentage points higher than freshman transfer and 10 points higher than sophomores.

■Graduated ■Still Enrolled ■Non-Persisters









■ Graduated ■ Still Enrolled ■ Dropout, Good ■ Dropout, Poor ■ Dropout, Unk.



Degrees Conferred UIC

HIGHLIGHTS

- In FY 1995, the campus conferred 5,301 degrees. This number is the highest for the ten-year period. See Table 20. Degrees granted have increased substantially at the master's and doctorate level since the mid-eighties with master's degrees increasing by almost 40 percent and doctorates increasing by almost 70 percent.
- Table 21 displays the number of undergraduate degrees conferred by college since 1985, with 3,003 in 1995. The number of degrees conferred in the largest college, Liberal Arts and Sciences, moved between 900 and 1,200 baccalaureate degrees during the ten-year period.
- Table 22 reports degrees conferred by level by gender in FY 1995. Females account for 53 percent of the undergraduate degrees, 61 percent of the master's, and 43 percent of doctorate and professional degrees.
- Tables 23 and 23.1 report the number and percent of FY 1995 degrees conferred by race/ethnicity. Overall, 60 percent of FY 1995 degrees were granted to White students compared to 67 percent in FY 1990. Degrees to Black and Hispanic students range from 19 percent of all bachelor's degrees to 6 percent of all doctoral degrees.

Percent Change in UIC Degrees Conferred by Level -- FY 1985 and FY 1995








Campus Enrollments UIS

HIGHLIGHTS

- Total headcount enrollment at Springfield has increased to the highest level in the past ten years, numbering 4,702. Undergraduate enrollment peaked in 1992 with some decline since then. Graduate enrollment reached a level some 300 students higher than in previous years. The graduate student increase was in part driven by a change in enrollment policy.
 - Undergraduate and graduate enrollment is rather evenly split at 2,540 undergraduates and 2,162 graduates.
- Comparing last fall to this fall, new undergraduates are up in number while continuing students are down somewhat. An increase in graduate students occurred in both new and continuing students while the number of nondegreeseeking graduate students fell since last year.
- Table 26 shows increases in undergraduate enrollment in all four UIS Schools compared to 1986. The School of Health and Human Services increased by the largest number of students, 228; and percentage gain, 45 percent.
- Fall 1995 enrollment by college by gender by level is displayed on Table 27 and ten-year trends by gender and level are shown in Table 28 and Figures 23-23. Campus-wide, female students have outnumbered male students throughout the period, though the graduate numbers were almost equal in 1986. Currently, female students represent 64 percent of undergraduates and 57 percent of graduate students.
- In the last ten years, Black undergraduate students have increased both in number and as a percent of total, from 104 to 192 students and from 5.5 to 7.6 percent of the total. At the graduate level, there have been similar increases in Black student numbers and representation; however, there was a small decrease in the percentage of Black students from last fall to this fall. See Tables 29-30 and Figures 24-25.
- Figures 26 and 27 display the geographic distribution of Illinois students at UIS.
 Nearly every county in Illinois is represented, though most students resided in Sangamon County at the time of their application.









UIS Undergraduate Minority Enrollment As a Percentage of Total Undergraduate Enrollment Fall 1986 - Fall 1995




UIS Graduate Minority Enrollment As a Percentage of Total Graduate Enrollment Fall 1986 - Fall 1995

GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION OF UIS STUDENT RESIDENCY FALL 1995



New Student Characteristics UIS

HIGHLIGHTS

- In the last ten years, enrollment of new transfers in the Schools of Health and Human Services and Liberal Arts and Sciences increased substantially--by 36 percent and 64 percent, respectively. Those same Schools show increases from 1994 to 1995.
- Table 33 displays selected demographic statistics of the fall 1995 new undergraduate students. One third of these students are age 30 or more while just under a third are age 20-21. Most are female and White and transfer from Lincoln Land College. Fulland part-time attendance is divided equally.
- The new graduate student cohort is older and somewhat more diverse in race/ethnicity than new transfers. Most are part-time students and the mix by gender is somewhat more female than male.
- The map in Figure 29 shows the number of new undergraduate students by the Illinois community college from which they transferred. Students transferred from all but eight of the institutions. Lincoln Land is the largest feeder at 213 students in fall 1995. It is followed by Illinois Central at 61 and Richland at 53.




Academic Performance UIS

HIGHLIGHTS

- Table 35 reflects the long attendance patterns of undergraduates at UIS. In the fourth year after matriculation over 10 percent of the students, who began at UIS primarily as juniors, are still enrolled. After eight years, around 50 percent have graduated and some 3 percent are still enrolled.
- Retention rates by school vary from year to year but generally are near 65 percent after three or four years. A snapshot of a single class shows a five-year graduation rate for the 1989 cohort of 51 percent in the School of Business and Management, 58 percent in the School of Health and Human Services, 60 percent in the School of Liberal Arts and Sciences, and 54 percent in the School of Public Affairs and Administration.
- FY 1992 FY 1994 graduates are aggregated in the display on Table 37 by the major in which they entered and the one in which they earned a degree. The vast majority of students earn a degree in the same major in which they begin at UIS. The net movement shows that students more often move to Child, Family, and Community Services; English; and Economics.

Fall beginning transfers include new full— and part—time students entering either in the fall or summer preceding the fall term. The cohort includes degree—seeking students only; however, the definition used in this table (and in the next table, Table 36) is more inclusive than displayed in the other sections of this publication. Also please note that Table 35 includes degree—seeking students who are not enrolled in a school (undecided), while Table 36 excludes these students. In this table, "enrolled" includes students enrolled anytime during the entire fiscal year; these data do not portray a snapshot of fall term enrollment only. Degrees granted during the summer term are counted with the subsequent fall. Thus, a student earning a baccalaureate degree in the summer following the second year after matriculation would be counted as graduated in the third year.

Table 35 illustrates that some students at UIS are enrolled well beyond the traditionally expected two years for junior—level transfers. For example, four years after entering UIS, between 10 and 15 percent of the cohort are still enrolled. Eight years after entering, some 2 to 4 percent are still enrolled. Graduation rates after eight years range from 49 to 56 percent for the 1982 through 1986 cohorts.

The following graph depicts the percentage still enrolled, graduated, and no longer enrolled of the 1988 cohort for the second through sixth years following matriculation. After two years, nearly 20 percent of the students graduated, with over 50 percent enrolled. By the sixth year following matriculation, 52 percent of the cohort had graduated, and 6 percent were still enrolled.

UIS Beginning Transfers Retention Patterns for 1988 Cohort



HIGHLIGHTS

- In FY 1995, UIS awarded 867 degrees--629 bachelor's degrees and 238 master's degrees. The numbers are lower than last fiscal year, but bachelor's degrees are up by about half again as many as awarded ten years ago. Much of the increase is attributable to a larger number of bachelor's degrees conferred in the School of Business and Management. See Table 38.
- In three schools: Business and Management, Liberal Arts and Sciences, and Public Affairs and Administration, degrees are awarded rather equally to male and female students--males receive 47 percent of the bachelor's degrees and 45 percent of the master's degrees. In the other school, Health and Human Services, males earn 22 percent of bachelor's degrees and 25 percent of master's degrees.
- White students have received approximately 90 percent of the degrees awarded at Springfield in the last ten fiscal years. The largest minority, Black students, earned about 5 percent of all degrees.

Percent Change in UIS Degrees Conferred by Level and School FY 1986 and FY 1995




HIGHLIGHTS

- During the past ten years, total enrollment on the Urbana campus has been stable, at about 36,000 students with fall 1995 total enrollment at 36,465. Graduate enrollment generally increased during the period, though it moved down slightly since a high in 1993. Professional enrollment is at the highest level of the period.
- Throughout the period, new freshmen composed approximately 20 percent of undergraduate enrollment and new transfers, 4 to 6 percent (Table 42).
- Table 43 shows that fall 1995 undergraduate enrollment is lower in all but two colleges, Applied Life Studies and Aviation, when compared to fall 1985. Table 44 displays 1995 graduate enrollment by college by level by gender. The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the College of Engineering enroll the highest numbers of graduate students.
- Figures 35-37 illustrate trends in enrollment by gender. Males continue to represent the majority of the undergraduate and graduate populations. However, the professional student cohort has moved from a nearly 2:1 male to female ratio to almost 1:1 in the last ten years with females now comprising a slight majority in the professional population.
- The racial/ethnic diversity of the undergraduate students increased significantly during the past decade with Black students moving from 4.0 percent of the total to 7.0 percent and Hispanic students from 1.9 to 5.5 percent. For graduate students the percentage of Black students approximately doubled to 4.0 percent and Hispanic students to 2.1 percent. Professional Black and Hispanic student enrollment percentages increased substantially since the middle eighties, moving from 3.3 to 8.2 percent of the total for Blacks and 1.3 to 4.4 percent for Hispanics. See Tables 46-47 and Figures 38-40.
- The maps in Figure 41 illustrate the geographical origin of undergraduate and graduate/professional populations. While the graduate/professional cohort represents a wider geographic distribution, 92 percent of undergraduates are Illinois residents.
- The geographic origin of international students is displayed in Table 48.









UIUC Professional Enrollment Distribution by Gender Fall 1985 - Fall 1995







UIUC Undergraduate Minority Enrollment As a Percentage of Total Undergraduate Enrollment Fall 1985 - Fall 1995



GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION OF UIUC STUDENT RESIDENCY FALL 1995



New Student Characteristics UIUC

HIGHLIGHTS

- The total number of beginning freshmen at UIUC ranged from about 5,250 to 6,400 students in the last ten years. In fall 1995, 6,113 beginning freshmen enrolled compared to 5,755 in 1994 and 6,393 in 1985. See Table 49.
- Beginning freshman enrollment by college is lower in four colleges in 1995 than 1985--Education, Engineering, Fine and Applied Arts, and Liberal Arts and Sciences. The largest college, Liberal Arts and Sciences, enrolled a high of 3,130 new freshmen in 1985, a low of 2,426 in 1989, and 2,952 students in 1995.
- New transfer enrollments are lower in 1995 than in 1994 and 28
 percent fewer than a decade ago. The 1985 cohort represents
 one of the largest classes of transfers in the decade and 1995
 one of the smallest.
- UIUC continues to attract top high school graduates, as illustrated in Tables 51 and 52. However, the percent of the UIUC new freshman students who placed in the upper quartile of their respective high school classes decreased to 85 in both fall 1994 and 1995 from a high of 90 in 1988. This decrease is the result of assigning estimated ranks to students coming from high schools which do not rank.
- Tables 53-55 present selected demographics of the fall 1995 new students. The geographic characteristics such as origin, residency, and transfer institution are mapped in Figures 44-46. The Chicago metropolitan area provides the largest numbers of beginning freshmen to UIUC; however, several downstate counties—Champaign, Peoria, Madison, McLean, and Sangamon—also are large feeder counties. The 1995 freshman class is composed of more out-of-state and international students than in the past. Parkland College and the College of DuPage send the largest numbers of transfers to UIUC.

Percent of Fall 1995 Beginning Freshmen from Top Ten Percent of H.S. Class by College of Entry





In October 1989, the American College Testing Program (ACT) introduced the Enhanced ACT Assessment. This test, usually taken by high school juniors and seniors, was similar but not identical to the previously used Assessment instrument.

Because changes in the new test yielded differences in the scoring distribution, scores on the two tests are NOT interchangeable. ACT has published concordance tables which show scores on the former test to be equivalent to a higher score on the Enhanced Test. To convert the former score to an equivalent Enhanced score, the rule of thumb at the upper end is to add one (1) to the former test score and on the lower end to add anywhere from three to five points to the former score. Recent average scores for Illinois test takers are reported above in order to better compare the composite means.





GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION OF UIUC NEW STUDENT RESIDENCY FALL 1995



HIGHLIGHTS

- One-year retention rates by college are reported in Table 56.
 Overall, approximately 90 percent of the freshman class was still enrolled on clear or probationary status at the end of their first year.
- Table 57 tracks the mean grade point averages for the 1987 transfers from community colleges and four-year institutions for six semesters after transfer. The community college transfers dropped over one-half of a grade point the first semester, but the group average improved in the succeeding terms.
- Graduation and retention patterns are reported in Tables 58 and 59 for beginning freshmen and transfers. For freshmen, the graduation rate after eight years is 80 percent. For transfers, the graduation rate after three years for the fall 1987 cohort is 69 percent with nearly 10 percent still enrolled.

Retention Rates for Beginning Freshmen One Year After Matriculation Fall 1994 Cohort





In fall 1987, 741 students from community colleges transferred to UIUC entering with a mean cumulative GPA of 4.26. After one semester, the mean GPA for this cohort dropped to 3.72. At the end of four semesters, or two years after transfer, the mean GPA for this cohort had increased to 3.97. Retention and graduation rates for this cohort are reported in Table 59 which shows that by the end of the fifth term, over fifty percent had graduated.

In fall 1987, 466 students from four—year colleges and universities transferred to UIUC entering with a mean cumulative GPA of 4.15. At the end of one semester, this cohort's mean GPA dropped to 3.86, a smaller decrease than experienced by the community college cohort. At the end of four semesters, or two years after transfer, the mean GPA for this cohort increased to 4.08. Retention and graduation rates for this cohort are also reported in Table 59.

Fall beginning freshmen include full—time freshmen entering in the summer preceding the fall term. Summer degrees are counted with the preceding spring. Enrollment figures are given for the percentage enrolled through that year. Year two, and so on, reflects the number of students enrolled through the second year and the number of degrees conferred during that year. All percents are cumulative percents for each entering fall term. These data might incur rounding error. This Data Book presents data revised from previous Data Books. The methodology follows that used to report statistics for the AAUDE Retention and Graduation Survey.

Table 58 reports enrollment, graduation and retention patterns for fall 1982 to fall 1992 beginning freshmen cohorts. Retention percentages include students who have graduated during the year or are still enrolled at the end of the academic year. For example, of those freshmen who entered UIUC in fall 1984, less than one percent were still enrolled and 80 percent had graduated after eight years, to yield a retention rate of just over 80 percent.

In fall 1982, 5,650 students enrolled as beginning freshmen and eight years later 78.8 percent of those students had received their baccalaureate degrees. The highest eight year graduation rate is reported for falls 1984 and 1986 beginning freshman cohorts with a 80.6 percent graduation rate.

UIUC Beginning Freshmen Retention Patterns for 1986 Cohort



The above tables report cumulative enrollment, graduation, and retention rates for community college and four-year transfers who matriculated to UIUC in fall 1987. This cohort was tracked for three years after transfer.

In fall 1987, 741 new students transferred from community colleges to UIUC. Of that initial cohort, 508 students graduated after six semesters representing a graduation rate of 68.6 percent. From four—year colleges 466 new students transferred to UIUC and 319 (68.5 percent) graduated after three years. Compared to beginning freshmen five years after matriculation, transfer cohorts graduate at slightly lower rates but are still enrolled at slightly higher rates.

Degrees Conferred UIUC

HIGHLIGHTS


- In FY 1995, the campus conferred approximately 7 percent more total degrees than in FY 1985. The number of degrees conferred is one of the highest in the period reported, slightly less than the degrees conferred in FY 1994. Master's and doctoral degrees increased sharply since 1985, by about 20 percent each.
- As presented in Table 61, most of the larger colleges conferred the same or fewer baccalaureate degrees in FY 1995 than in the mid-eighties. The exception is the largest college, Liberal Arts & Sciences, which awarded 16 percent more degrees than in FY 1985.
- From FY 1985 to FY 1995, about 45 percent of the undergraduate degrees went to female students. See Table 62.
- Tables 63 and 63.1 report undergraduate degrees conferred by race/ethnicity. The percentage distribution of undergraduate degrees conferred to minority students has substantially increased in the last ten years. The proportion of degrees conferred to Black and Hispanic students has more than doubled that of 1985, while degrees to White students have declined from 90 percent to 76 percent of the total.

Percent Change in UIUC Undergraduate Degrees Conferred by College FY 1985 and FY 1995


