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

HIGHLIGHTS

- During the past ten years, total enrollment on the Urbana campus numbered between 35,000 and 37,000 students. This fall, total enrollment reached 36,936, the highest point in the decade. Undergraduate students total 27,882, just slightly higher than last year but some 400 more than the previous fall. Graduate enrollment increased during the early nineties to a peak of over 9,000 students, decreased to a low point last year, then climbed to 8,055 students in fall 2000. At 999 students, professional enrollment is higher than any fall in the last ten years. See Table 42 and Figure 32.
- In fall 1998 and 1999 the number of new freshmen increased sharply, while this fall enrollment was held to a more typical level, 6,177 freshmen. New freshmen classes range from a low of 5,651 in 1991 to the high of 6,479 in 1999. See Table 43.
- Table 44 and Figure 34 show that fall 2000 undergraduate enrollment is higher in most colleges than it was ten years ago. Table 45 displays fall 2000 graduate enrollment by college by level by gender. The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the College of Engineering enroll the highest numbers of students at both the undergraduate and graduate levels.
- Figures 35-37 and Table 46 illustrate trends in enrollment by gender. Males continue to represent the majority of the undergraduate and graduate populations; however, the percentages have decreased steadily. While the ratio of males to females was nearly 55/45 in the professional student cohort nine years ago, the ratio has nearly reversed.
- The racial/ethnic diversity of the undergraduate student body increased significantly during the first half of the decade then has held steady in recent years. Black and Hispanic students now represent 11 percent of the student body—over 12 percent of undergraduates, over 8 percent of graduates, and over 10 percent of professional students, — nearly half again the level of the late eighties. See Tables 47-48 and Figures 38-40.
- Table 49 and the maps in Figure 41 illustrate geographical origin. In-state students moved from 92.6 percent of all undergraduates in 1992 to 90.1 percent in fall 2000.











UIUC Professional Enrollment Distribution by Gender Fall 1990 - Fall 2000



UIUC FALL ENROLLMENT PERCENT DISTRIBUTION BY RACE/ETHNICITY FALL 1990 - FALL 2000






UIUC Graduate Minority Enrollment As a Percentage of Total Graduate Enrollment

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New Student Characteristics UIUC

HIGHLIGHTS

- At 6,177, the 2000 freshman class is smaller than the very large classes of 1998 and 1999 that numbered over 6,400 students, but still the third largest in the period. See Table 50.
- Beginning freshman enrollment by college is higher in four colleges in 2000 compared to ten years ago. The largest college, Liberal Arts and Sciences, enrolled slightly fewer new freshmen this fall than last but 15 percent more than ten years ago. See Table 50.
- Table 51 shows that new transfer enrollments are slightly lower in 2000 than in the four previous years, but substantially down (38 percent) from ten years ago.
- UIUC continues to attract top high school graduates, as illustrated in Tables 52 and 53. The mean ACT composite score of the 2000 freshman class is 27.1, higher than any other year in the period. Ninety percent of freshmen in the College of Engineering bring an ACT:C score of 27 or higher. Also see Figures 42 and 43.
- Tables 54-56 present selected demographics of the fall 1995 and 2000 new students. Geographic characteristics such as origin, residency, and transfer institution are mapped in Figures 44-46. Cook County (2,153) and the five other counties of the Chicago metropolitan area (1,700) provide the largest number of beginning freshmen to UIUC; however, several downstate counties—Champaign (231), McLean (86), and Sangamon (80)—also are large feeder counties. Parkland College (162) and the College of DuPage (65) send the largest numbers of transfer students to UIUC.



Percent of Fall 2000 Beginning Freshmen from Top Ten Percent of H.S. Class by College of Entry











HIGHLIGHTS

- One-year retention rates by college are reported in Table 57 and Figure 47. Overall, approximately 91 percent of the freshman class is still enrolled on clear or probationary status at the end of the first year.
- Table 58 tracks the mean grade point averages for the 1987 transfers from community colleges and four-year institutions for six semesters after transfer. The community college transfers dropped over one-half of a grade point the first semester, but the group average improved in the succeeding terms.
- Graduation and retention patterns are reported in Tables 59-60 and Figures 48-50 for beginning freshmen and transfers. For freshmen, the graduation rate after seven years is approximately 78 percent. The seven-year graduation rate is somewhat lower for the more recent cohorts than for earlier cohorts, while the five-year rate is higher for the most recent cohorts. Women succeed at a slightly higher rate than men as shown in Table 59.1.
- For transfers, the graduation rate after four years for the fall 1991 cohort is almost 70 percent including about 1 percent still enrolled.

In fall 1987, 741 students from community colleges transferred to UIUC entering with a mean cumulative GPA of 3.26. After one semester, the mean GPA for this cohort dropped to 2.72. At the end of four semesters, or two years after transfer, the mean GPA for this cohort had increased to 2.97.

In fall 1987, 466 students from four-year colleges and universities transferred to UIUC, entering with a mean cumulative GPA of 3.15. At the end of one semester, this cohort's mean GPA dropped to 2.86, a smaller decrease than experienced by the community college cohort. At the end of four semesters, or two years after transfer, the mean GPA for this cohort increased to 3.08.

Fall beginning freshmen include full-time freshmen entering in the summer preceding the fall term. The percentages in column "Year Two," and so on, reflect the percentage of students enrolled but not graduated during the second year, the cumulative percentage of degrees conferred through that year, and the retention for the second year -- the sum of enrolled and graduated students. These data might incur rounding error. The methodology follows that used to report statistics for the AAUDE Retention and Graduation Survey.

Year-to-year retention for the 1993 cohort is displayed in Figure 48 on the next page. Of those freshmen who entered UIUC in fall 1993, less than one percent were still enrolled and almost 78 percent had graduated after seven years, to yield a retention rate of 78.2 percent.



At UIUC, the retention rate of women is higher than for men, 80.8 percent and 76.2 percent respectively with the 1995 cohort. Both men and women show a decrease in retention over the cohorts entering five years ago, but an increase over the cohort that entered the previous fall.





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Degrees Conferred UIUC

HIGHLIGHTS

- In FY 2000, the campus conferred more than the number of total degrees granted a year ago. This level is the highest number since FY 1994 and some fifty more than were conferred ten years ago. The number of bachelor's degrees is the largest in the period while doctoral degrees are lower this year than any other year in the last decade, 600 compared to a high of 775 in FY 1992. See Table 61 and Figure 51.
- As presented in Table 62 and Figure 52, the pattern is mixed by college. The College of Applied Life Studies shows the largest increase in the period, up 120 percent over 1990.
- From FY 1990 to FY 1997, about 45 percent of the undergraduate degrees went to female students. In FY 1998 and FY 1999, the number shifted to over 47 percent and in FY 2000 climbed to over 48 percent, reflecting a slowly increasing number of female enrollments. See Table 63.
- Tables 64 and 64.1 report undergraduate degrees conferred by race/ethnicity. The percentage distribution of undergraduate degrees conferred to underrepresented students has substantially increased over the last ten years. The proportion of degrees conferred to minorities (Black and Hispanic students) moved up from 5.5 percent of total bachelor's degrees ten years ago to 9.3 percent in FY 2000. Though higher than in 1990, the proportion in 2000 is lower than in the most recent years when degrees to minority students increased to 10.2 percent of all students earning bachelor's degrees.

Percent Change in Bachelor's, Master's, and Doctorate Degrees FY 1990 and FY 2000




