EXPLANATORY NOTES FOR RETENTION AND GRADUATION

Graduation and retention rates are the result of many variables including academic performance, academic preparation, motivation, and academic integration. Other factors which seem to influence graduation and retention include part/full-time attendance, student age, family responsibilities, commuter/resident attendance, first-generation college attendance, socioeconomic status, employment, and indebtedness. The extent to which these factors combine and contribute to graduation and retention is not fully understood, but there is a considerable body of research documenting the complexities of the issue.

Throughout recent history the graduation rate of students in the United States who enter a university as beginning freshmen and earn bachelor's degrees from that same university four to six years later is approximately 50 percent. A freshman class with higher average ability, motivation, preparation, greater full-time attendance, etc. will graduate at higher rates than that average. The reverse is also true.

However, there are no hard and fast prediction models. The intervening variables are numerous and interrelated. For example, high motivation certainly can overcome under-preparedness just as low motivation can negate high ability. Better academic preparation may be the result of high academic ability or the consequence of higher socioeconomic status and thus a more positive high school environment.

It is tempting to compare institution-wide graduation rates among universities without accounting for the makeup of the student body. The reader is cautioned not to make blanket comparisons, for example, in the graduation and retention rates provided in this Data Book for the University of Illinois campuses. The student bodies of the campuses are different, and thus comparisons among the three would parallel the proverbial apples-to-oranges relationship.

One other caveat should be emphasized: Retention data presented in this and in previous Data Books were gathered from several different studies, each employing a slightly different methodology. The footnotes section of each table describes the definitions used for that table.



HIGHLIGHTS

- This fall, total enrollment at Urbana reached 37,679, the highest point in the decade. Undergraduate students total 28,110, about 200 more than the previous fall. Graduate enrollment increased during the early nineties to a peak of over 9,000 students, decreased to a low point in 1999, then climbed to 8,508 students in fall 2001. At 1,061 students, professional enrollment is higher than any fall in the last ten years. See Table 43 and Figure 32.
- In fall 1998 and 1999, the number of new freshmen increased sharply while this fall enrollment was held to a level lower than those falls—though still somewhat higher than typical. New freshmen classes range from a low of 5,500 in 1992, to the high of 6,479 in 1999, and numbers 6,247 students in fall 2001. See Table 44.
- Table 45 and Figure 34 show that fall 2001 undergraduate enrollment is higher in most colleges than it was ten years ago. Table 46 displays fall 2001 graduate enrollment by college, level, and gender. This fall the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences enrolled the highest numbers of students at both the undergraduate and graduate levels.
- Figures 35-37 and Table 47 illustrate trends in enrollment by gender. Males continue to represent the majority of the undergraduate and graduate populations; however, the percentages have decreased steadily. While the ratio of males to females was nearly 55/45 in the professional student cohort ten years ago, the ratio has nearly reversed.
- The racial/ethnic diversity of the undergraduate student body increased significantly during the first half of the decade but held steady in recent years. In 1991, Black and Hispanic students represented 9.6 percent of students. They now make up 11 percent of the student body—12.7 percent of undergraduates, 5.4 percent of graduate students, and 10.3 percent of professional students. See Tables 48-49 and Figures 38-40.
- Table 50 and the maps in Figure 41 illustrate geographical origin. In-state students moved from 92.6 percent of all undergraduates in 1992 to 89.2 percent in fall 2001.









UIUC Professional Enrollment Distribution by Gender Fall 1991 - Fall 2001



UIUC Undergraduate Minority Enrollment As a Percentage of Total Undergraduate Enrollment Fall 1991 - Fall 2001




UIUC Professional Minority Enrollment As a Percentage of Total Professional Enrollment Fall 1991 - Fall 2001



GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION OF UIUC STUDENT RESIDENCY FALL 2001



New Student Characteristics UIUC

HIGHLIGHTS

- At 6,247, the 2001 freshman class is smaller than the very large classes of 1998 and 1999 that numbered over 6,400 students, but still the third largest in the period. See Table 51.
- Beginning freshman enrollment by college is higher in four colleges in 2001 compared to ten years ago. The largest college, Liberal Arts and Sciences, enrolled almost 200 fewer new freshmen this fall than last but 15 percent more than ten years ago. See Table 51.
- Table 52 and 52.1 show that new transfer enrollments are slightly higher in 2001 than in the four previous years, but down over 10 percent from ten years ago.
- UIUC continues to attract top high school graduates, as illustrated in Tables 53 and 54. The mean high school percentile rank rose with the 2001 freshmen to 87.5 after several years below 87.0. The mean ACT composite score of the 2001 freshman class is 27.2, higher than any other year in the period. Nearly ninety percent of freshmen in the College of Engineering and eighty percent in Commerce and Business Administration bring an ACT:C score of 27 or higher. Also see Figures 42 and 43.
- Tables 55-57 present selected demographics of the fall 1996 and 2001 new students. Geographic characteristics such as origin, residency, and transfer institution are mapped in Figures 44-46. Cook County (2,157) and the five collar counties of the Chicago metropolitan area (1,662) provide the largest number of beginning freshmen to UIUC; however, several downstate counties— Champaign (204), Peoria (93), and McLean (91)—also are large feeder counties. Only three counties, Calhoun, Lawrence, and Pope, did not send students to UIUC. Parkland College (201) and the College of DuPage (64) send the largest numbers of transfer students to UIUC.







GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION OF UIUC NEW STUDENT RESIDENCY FALL 2001



HIGHLIGHTS

- One-year retention rates by college are reported in Table 58 and Figure 47. Overall, approximately 93 percent of the freshman class is still enrolled on clear or probationary status at the end of the first year.
- Table 59 tracks the mean grade point averages for the 1987 transfers from community colleges and four-year institutions for six semesters after transfer. The community college transfers dropped over one-half of a grade point the first semester, but the group average improved in the succeeding terms.
- Graduation and retention patterns are reported in Tables 60-61 and Figures 48-50 for beginning freshmen and transfers. For freshmen, the graduation rate after seven years is approximately 78 percent. The seven-year graduation rate is somewhat lower for the more recent cohorts than for earlier cohorts, while the five-year rate is higher for the two most recent cohorts than for most earlier ones.
- Women succeed at a higher rate than men—as shown in Table 60.1—with women at 84 percent and men at 79 percent graduated or still enrolled. For women, this is the highest rate of the last seven years.
- For transfers, the graduation rate after four years for the fall 1991 cohort is almost 70 percent including about 1 percent still enrolled. See Table 61.



In fall 1987, 741 students from community colleges transferred to UIUC entering with a mean cumulative GPA of 3.26. After one semester, the mean GPA for this cohort dropped to 2.72. At the end of four semesters, or two years after transfer, the mean GPA for this cohort had increased to 2.97.

In fall 1987, 466 students from four-year colleges and universities transferred to UIUC, entering with a mean cumulative GPA of 3.15. At the end of one semester, this cohort's mean GPA dropped to 2.86, a smaller decrease than experienced by the community college cohort. At the end of four semesters, or two years after transfer, the mean GPA for this cohort increased to 3.08.

Year-to-year retention for the 1994 cohort is displayed in Figure 48 on the next page. Of those freshmen who entered UIUC in fall 1994, less than one percent were still enrolled and over 77 percent had graduated after seven years, to yield a retention rate of 77.6 percent.

UIUC Beginning Freshmen Retention Patterns for 1994 Cohort



At UIUC, the retention rate of women is higher than for men, 83.8 percent and 78.8 percent respectively with the 1996 cohort. Both men and women show an increase in retention over the cohorts that entered in recent years.

■ GRADUATED ■ ENROLLED




Degrees Conferred UIUC

HIGHLIGHTS

- In FY 2001, the campus conferred 9,386 total degrees, some 200 fewer than last year and 150 more than ten years ago. Though less than the last couple of years, the number of bachelor's degrees awarded is one of the highest in the period. The number of doctoral degrees granted has generally declined in the past decade, with 667 in FY 2001 compared to a high of 775 in FY 1992. See Table 62 and Figure 51.
- As presented in Table 63 and Figure 52, the pattern is mixed by college. Veterinary Medicine shows the largest increase in the period, up 70 percent since 1991.
- For several years, about 45 percent of undergraduate degrees went to female students. Four years ago the rate increased to 46 percent, last year went to 47 percent, and then held at 47 percent in FY 2001. Slowly the percentage of women earning bachelors degrees has increased. See Table 64.
- Tables 65 and 65.1 report undergraduate degrees conferred by race/ethnicity. The percentage distribution of undergraduate degrees conferred to underrepresented students has substantially increased over the last ten years. The proportion of degrees conferred to minorities (Black and Hispanic students combined) moved up from 6.7 percent of total bachelor's degrees ten years ago to 10.7 percent in FY 2001. Bachelor's degrees awarded in 2001 represent a slightly larger proportion of minority students than any year in the period, 10.7 percent compared to 10.2 percent in the next highest year.

Percent Change in UIUC Degrees Conferred by Level FY 1991 and FY 2001



Percentage Change in UIUC Undergraduate Degrees Conferred by College³ FY 1991 and FY 2001




