EXPLANATORY NOTES FOR RETENTION AND GRADUATION

Graduation and retention rates are the result of many variables including academic performance, academic preparation, motivation, and academic integration. Other factors which seem to influence graduation and retention include part/full-time attendance, student age, family responsibilities, commuter/resident attendance, firstgeneration college attendance, socioeconomic status, employment, and indebtedness. The extent to which these factors combine and contribute to graduation and retention is not fully understood, but there is a considerable body of research documenting the complexities of the issue.

Throughout recent history the graduation rate of students in the United States who enter a university as beginning freshmen and work toward bachelor's degrees from that same university four to six years later is approximately 50 percent. A freshman class with higher than average ability, motivation, preparation, and greater full-time attendance, etc., will graduate at higher rates than that average. The reverse is also true.

However, there are no hard and fast prediction models. The intervening variables are numerous and interrelated. For example, high motivation certainly can overcome under-preparedness just as low motivation can negate high ability. Similarly, better academic preparation may be the result of high academic ability, or it may be the consequence of higher socioeconomic status, and thus a more positive high school environment.

It is tempting to compare institution-wide graduation rates among universities without accounting for the makeup of the student body. The reader is cautioned not to make blanket comparisons, for example, in the graduation and retention rates provided in this Data Book for the University of Illinois campuses. The student bodies of the campuses are different, and thus comparisons among the three would parallel the proverbial apples-to-oranges relationship.

One other caveat should be emphasized: Retention data presented in this and in previous Data Books were gathered from several different studies, each employing a slightly different methodology. The footnotes section of each table describes the definitions used for that table.


Campus Enrollments UIS

HIGHLIGHTS

- Total headcount enrollment at Springfield, 4,574, is the highest since the midnineties. Undergraduate enrollment dropped in the late nineties, but has risen the last three falls to 2,569 students this year. In this, the third class of new freshmen, the number climbed from 97 to 116 this year, the same number as began in 2001. This fall 606 new transfer students entered UIS. New undergraduate transfer enrollment is similar to the last two years. Continuing undergraduate enrollment is higher than in recent years, but is lower than the tenyear high in 1993; over 250 additional students are continuing this fall compared to last. New doctoral students continue to be few. New master's students are up by almost 200 compared to last year's small class; current master's program enrollment is second highest in the decade. See Tables 24-25 and Figure 20.
- Total enrollment comprises 2,569 undergraduate students, 1,987 master's students, and 18 doctoral students. See Table 25.
- Table 26 shows a large increase in undergraduate enrollment in the Colleges of Liberal Arts and Sciences compared to 1993, and decreases in Business and Management and Education and Human Services. Some of the change is the result of programs being moved among colleges. See Figure 21.
- Fall 2003 enrollment by college, by level, and by gender is displayed on Table 27 and ten-year trends by gender and level are shown in Table 28 and Figures 22-23. Campus-wide, female students have outnumbered male students throughout the period. Currently, female students comprise 60 percent of students.
- Undergraduate enrollment of Black students has generally risen over the ten-year period, and in 2003 is at the highest number and proportion in the period; 210 students, or 8.2 percent. At the Master's level, Black student enrollment is down slightly from last year; now 150 students (7.5 percent). See Tables 29-30 and Figures 24-25. In 1998 a doctorate was introduced at UIS. The program has high Black representation, currently 17 percent.
- Figures 26 and 27 display the geographic distribution of Illinois students at UIS. Nearly 80 counties in Illinois are represented, though most students reside in Sangamon County at the time of their application. Table 31 shows that 173 international students come to UIS from approximately 30 different countries. International student enrollment is down by 10 students from last year.
- UIS has a growing online program of some 1000 students. About two-thirds take online classes exclusively. See page 51.

UIS FALL ENROLLMENT BY LEVEL AND ADMISSION CATEGORY FALL 1993 - FALL 2003







UIS Masters/Doctoral Enrollment Distribution by Gender Fall 1993 - Fall 2003





UIS FALL ENROLLMENT PERCENT DISTRIBUTION BY RACE/ETHNICITY FALL 1993 - FALL 2003






UIS Graduate Minority Enrollment As a Percentage of Total Graduate Enrollment Fall 1993 - Fall 2003



GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION OF ILLINOIS STUDENT RESIDENCY FALL 2003











New Student Characteristics UIS

HIGHLIGHTS

- This year's incoming freshman class of Capital Scholars, which numbers 116, was larger than last year's class by 19 students, and the same as the 2001 inaugural class. Most students (113) are from Illinois, and 18 percent come from Sangamon County. This year's freshman class is different compared to previous cohorts on a number of metrics. The 2003 mean ACT Composite score is 26.2, up from 25.0 last year. The mean high school percentile rank has also risen, from 79.0 last year to 81.0 this year. This year, almost two-thirds of new freshmen are female, and 89 percent are White; just over half of incoming students last year were female and just over 82 percent were White. See Table 32 and Figure 28.
- Similar to enrollment numbers in the last two years, this fall 606 new transfers enrolled. Due in part to organizational changes, from 1993 to 2003, the number of transfer students entering Liberal Arts and Sciences has grown by two and one-half times. In addition to restructuring, with the closing of the Nursing program in 1997 the College of Education and Human Services enrolls few transferees. See Table 33.
- Table 34 displays selected demographic statistics of fall 2003 new transfer students. Over a quarter of these students are aged 30 and over. Over 60 percent are female, 87 percent are White, and 11 percent are minorities. One-third transfer from Springfield's Lincoln Land College. At 72 percent, full-time transfer students are more heavily represented than five years ago when they made up just under 62 percent.
- The map in Figure 29 shows the number of new transfer students in 2003 by the Illinois community college last attended and Table 35 shows the fiveyear trend in new transfer enrollment by sending institution. Students transferred from three-quarters of Illinois' community colleges in 2003. Lincoln Land is the largest feeder at 202 students, followed by Illinois Central at 54 and Richland at 29. These same institutions have consistently been the top feeder schools, sending 902, 257, and 146 students, respectively, over the past five years. See Table 35.
- About 60 percent of new graduate students are over 25 years old. Sixteen percent are minority students, and 6 percent are of international origin. Approximately 70 percent are part-time students, and over 60 percent are female. See Table 36.





HIGHLIGHTS

- Table 37 displays the extended attendance patterns of undergraduate students at UIS. Five years after beginning, 6 to 9 percent of students, who transfer to UIS primarily as juniors, are still enrolled. After eight years, about 55 percent have graduated and some 2 to 5 percent are still enrolled.
- Retention rates by school vary from year to year, but a snapshot of a single class shows a five-year graduation rate for the 1989 cohort of 51 percent in the College of Business and Management, 58 percent in the College of Education and Health Services, 60 percent in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, and 54 percent in the College of Public Affairs and Administration. See Table 38.
- FY 1992 FY 1994 graduates are aggregated in the display on Table 39 by the major in which they entered and the major in which they earned a degree. The vast majority of students earn a degree in the same major in which they begin at UIS. Of those who do change majors, graduates more often move to Child, Family, and Community Services; English; or Economics.



Fall beginning transfers include new full-time and part-time students entering either in the fall or summer preceding the fall term. The cohort includes degree-seeking students only; however, the definition used in this table (and in the next table, Table 38) is more inclusive than displayed in the other sections of this publication. Also please note that Table 37 includes degree-seeking students who are not enrolled in a college (undecided), while Table 38 excludes these students. "Enrolled" includes students enrolled anytime during the entire fiscal year; these data do not portray a snapshot of fall term enrollment only. Degrees granted during the summer term are counted with the subsequent fall. Thus, a student earning a baccalaureate degree in the summer following the second year after matriculation would be counted as graduated in the third year.

Table 37 illustrates that some students at UIS are enrolled well beyond the traditionally expected two years for junior-level transfers. For example, four years after entering UIS, upwards of 11 percent of the cohort are still enrolled. Eight years after entering, some 2 to 5 percent are still enrolled. Graduation rates after eight years approach 60 percent.

The following graph depicts the percentage still enrolled, graduated, and no longer enrolled of the 1997 cohort for the second through sixth years following matriculation. After two years, over 21 percent of the students had graduated, with over 56 percent enrolled. By the sixth year following matriculation, 61.5 percent of the cohort had graduated, and almost 4 percent were still enrolled.


HIGHLIGHTS

- In FY 2003, UIS conferred 607 undergraduate degrees, similar to the numbers awarded in recent years, but 6 percent lower than the number of bachelor's degrees awarded ten years ago. Master's degrees conferred were up by over 20 in FY 2003 compared to last year; at 381, the number is 38 percent higher than FY 1993 and tied with 1996 for the ten-year high. At 988, total degrees granted was up from last year and is up 7 percent over ten years ago and the second highest number in the ten-year period. See Table 40 and Figure 31.
- Liberal Arts and Sciences conferred more degrees and posted a larger ten-year increase than did the other colleges at the bachelor's level. At the master's level, Public Affairs and Administration granted the highest number and showed the largest percent increase. Compared to the previous year, however, Business and Management granted 76 percent more master's degrees, EHS granted 40 percent more, while PAA and LAS awarded 37 percent and 10 percent fewer, respectively. Reorganization of the colleges may explain some of the changes in the numbers of degrees awarded during the period displayed in Table 40.
- Table 41 shows degrees conferred by gender. Females receive the majority of degrees awarded in every college and at each level, except for master's degrees awarded in the College of Business and Management. Females received 67 percent of bachelor's degrees awarded and 56 percent of master's degrees. Both of these proportions favored women less than last year, when 76 percent of bachelor's degrees and 62 percent of master's degrees were awarded to women.
- Tables 42 and 42.1 show the number of degrees conferred by race/ethnicity. In FY 2003, White students received 86.7 percent of degrees conferred and Black or Hispanic students received 7.4 percent; this distribution is similar to that of FY 2003. Though representing less than 2 percent of all degrees awarded, more Asian/Pacific Islander students received degrees in FY 2003 than ten years ago, representing over a 100 percent increase in ten years.
