EXPLANATORY NOTES FOR RETENTION AND GRADUATION

Graduation and retention rates are the result of many variables including academic performance, academic preparation, motivation, and academic integration. Other factors which seem to influence graduation and retention include part/full-time attendance, student age, family responsibilities, commuter/resident attendance, firstgeneration college attendance, socioeconomic status, employment, and indebtedness. The extent to which these factors combine and contribute to graduation and retention is not fully understood, but there is a considerable body of research which has documented the complexities of the issue.

Throughout recent history the graduation rate of students in the United States who enter a university as beginning freshmen and earn bachelor's degrees from that same university four to six years later is approximately 50 percent. A freshman class with higher average ability, motivation, preparation, greater full-time attendance, etc. will graduate at higher rates than that average. The reverse is also true.

However, there are no hard and fast prediction models. The intervening variables are numerous and interrelated. For example, high motivation certainly can overcome under-preparedness just as low motivation can negate high ability. Better academic preparation may be the result of high academic ability or the consequence of higher socioeconomic status and thus a more positive high school environment.

It is tempting to compare institution-wide graduation rates among universities without accounting for the makeup of the student body. The reader is cautioned not to make blanket comparisons, for example, in the graduation and retention rates provided in this Data Book for the two University of Illinois campuses. The student bodies of the campuses are different, and thus comparisons between the two would parallel the customary apples-to-oranges relationship. The reader should bear in mind that at the first term of enrollment at UIC over 20 percent of new transfers are part-time students (eventually nearly 55 percent become part-time students), almost one-half are admitted as freshmen or sophomores, the average age is 23.4 years, and about 60 percent commute from a residence outside the city of Chicago. In addition, new transfers make up almost one-half of the new students. This profile differs markedly from the new students enrolled at UIUC of which only about 20 percent are new transfers, and most transfers enter at the junior level.

One other caveat should be emphasized: Retention data presented in this and in previous Data Books were gathered from several different studies, each employing slightly different methodologies. The footnotes section of each table describes the definitions used for the table.

EXPLANATORY NOTES FOR CHICAGO STUDENT DATA

In 1986, the Health Sciences Center campus and the University Center campus merged. To provide consistency in reporting enrollment data, figures for 1980 through 1986 have been adjusted to reflect this merger and report enrollments for the combined campuses.

In 1984, UIC initiated a Pharmacy Doctorate Program at the professional level. Students in this program had formerly been included in the undergraduate pharmacy enrollment totals. Due to this change in classification, students entering the Pharmacy Doctorate Program from 1984 through 1986 were subtracted from the undergraduate enrollment totals reported in the Enrollment Tables produced by the University Office of School and College Relations. This will explain increases in the Professional enrollments from 1984 through 1986.

Beginning in 1982, the Dentistry Post-Professional students were included among the Professional enrollments rather than with the Resident enrollments. To achieve consistency in reporting, students enrolled in the Dentistry Post-Professional Program prior to 1982 have been included in the Professional category.

Enrollment data for UIC is based on four sources: 1) Office of Data Resources and Institutional Analysis (DRIA), 2) the Student Data Book which is produced by DRIA, 3) the Enrollment Tables produced by the University Office of School and College Relations, and 4) Integrated Post-Secondary Education Data System (IPEDS), reported by the University of Illinois to the Illinois Board of Higher Education. The data were consistent in almost all instances; however, when discrepancies occurred, enrollment figures reported in the Enrollment Tables were used.


HIGHLIGHTS

- During the past ten years, enrollments on the Chicago campus were stable. As Figure 1 illustrates, graduate and professional enrollments increased since fall 1981 while undergraduate enrollment generally decreased over this period.
- As indicated in Table 2, the number of beginning freshmen and transfers each constituted approximately 15 percent of all undergraduates; readmissions, 4 percent; and continuing students, 65 percent.
- In comparing fall 1981 and fall 1991 undergraduate enrollments, most colleges experienced decreases, as illustrated in Figure 3, although levels fluctuated in the intervening years. The College of Nursing enrolled fewer students in both 1990 and 1991 than in any other year in the period.
- Figure 4 illustrates trends in undergraduate and graduate enrollments by gender. The ratio of males to females is almost equal at undergraduate and graduate levels. The professional cohort has changed from an approximate 80 percent male and 20 percent female proportion in 1981 to a more equal representation in 1991; however, gender data are not available for over 25 percent of professional students for fall 1990 and 1991.
- The undergraduate cohort is represented by a more diverse racial/ethnic population in fall 1991 than in fall 1981. As Figure 7 illustrates, as a percent of the total, Asian/Pacific Islander and Hispanic enrollment has risen while, as a percentage, Black enrollment has fallen somewhat.
- The maps in Figures 9 and 10 illustrate the geographical origin of first-time freshmen and graduate/professional enrollments. While the graduate/professional cohort represents a wider geographical distribution, 97 percent of UIC first-time freshmen are Illinois residents.



UIC New Student Enrollment Fall 1981 - Fall 1991












New Student Characteristics UIC

HIGHLIGHTS

- As Table 10.1 indicates, beginning freshman enrollment has decreased by 18.5 percent when comparing 1981 to 1991. Over the period, new freshman enrollment decreased in the mid eighties, then increased somewhat into the nineties. Much of the later increase can be attributed to higher numbers in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.
- New transfer enrollments decreased by 8.4 percent from fall 1981 to fall 1991. In 1991 the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences enrolled its fewest transfers for the period covered, yet still accounted for over half of all transfers.
- A larger percentage of the 1991 beginning freshmen graduated in the upper quartile of their high school class than in 1981.
 See Table 12 and Figure 11. However, the 1991 level is somewhat lower than the high reached for this period.
- The average high school percentile rank of new freshmen at UIC is somewhat lower in 1991 than in recent years; however, it is significantly higher now than in the early eighties.
- Tables 14 and 15 present selected demographics of the fall 1991 beginning students. Figure 12 displays beginning freshmen by county of origin and Figure 13 charts the district from which community college students transferred. The Chicago metropolitan area continues to be the main source of UIC new undergraduate students with 90 percent of the total enrollment.

UIC Beginning Freshmen Percent Distribution by HSPR Quartiles Fall 1981 and Fall 1991



In October 1989, the American College Testing Program (ACT) introduced the Enhanced ACT Assessment. This test, usually taken by high school juniors and seniors, was similar but not identical to the previous Assessment instrument. Because changes in the new test yielded differences in the scoring distribution, scores on the two tests are NOT interchangeable. ACT has published condordance tables which show scores on the former test to be equivalent to a higher score on the Enhanced Test. To convert the former score to an equivalent Enhanced score, the rule of thumb at the upper end is to add one (1) to the former test score and on the lower end to add anywhere from three to five points to the former score. Recent average scores for Illinois test takers are reported above in order to better compare the composite means.

Both the U of I and Illinois 1990 test data include scores which were converted to the original ACT from Enhanced scores.






Academic Performance UIC

HIGHLIGHTS

- Graduation patterns for UIC beginning freshmen cohorts are reported in Table 16. Five-year graduation rates range from 19 percent for the 1980 cohort to 27.5 percent for the 1983 cohort. The most recent cohort for which five-year data are available (1985) shows a graduation rate of 23.0 percent.
- Though the graduation rate of beginning freshmen after five years has decreased somewhat for later cohorts, the percent still enrolled has increased as shown in Table 17. After five years, retention has increased from 33 percent to 42 percent for the 1980 and 1985 cohorts.
- Table 18 displays retention data for the 1983, 1984, and 1985 new freshman cohorts. As noted in the table, these data were collected differently than those reported in Tables 16 and 17. Yet even when using a conservative definition of enrollment, the percent enrolled increases after five years--from 12.8 percent (1983 cohort), to 14.5 percent (1984) to 17.3 percent (1985). (Degrees conferred in the summer 1990 term were not captured in this study; hence, the enrollment figure for the 1985 cohort is somewhat inflated and the graduation percentage is slightly deflated.)
- Retention rates for the fall 1984 transfer cohort are reported in Table 19. At UIC about half of the transfer students enter as freshmen or sophomores. Two years after enrolling, 6 percent of the community college transfers and 10 percent of the four-year college transfers had graduated, and over one-third of each of the groups were still enrolled. Retention rates two years after enrolling were 42 percent for community college transfers and 43 percent for transfers from four-year institutions. These rates are slightly below the four-year retention rates for the fall 1984 beginning freshman cohort.
- First-time transfers who matriculated to UIC in fall 1980 were tracked for eight years following transfer as shown in Table 20. By the end of the fourth year, 26 percent graduated and by the end of the eighth year, 33 percent graduated. Retention rates appear to have increased since the 1980 cohort, but these data illustrate the long attendance patterns of transfers to UIC.

Table 16 reports the percentage of fall 1980 to fall 1987 beginning freshmen who have graduated. This Data Book includes updates since the last edition of the Data Book for Fall Entering Terms 1983–86. In fall 1980, 3,173 students enrolled as beginning freshmen and eight years later, 831 or 26 percent of those freshmen had received their baccalaureate degrees. The graduation rates of the 1980 cohort contrasts sharply with those of the 1983 and 1984 cohorts. The highest graduation rate is reported for the fall 1984 beginning freshman cohort with a 30.3 percent graduation rate after six years. The mean ACT: Composite score for the 1984 cohort was 20.1 compared to around 18.0 for the two earliest cohorts.

Notes: Fall Beginning Freshmen include freshmen entering in the fall quarter only. From 1980 through 1983, summer degrees are counted with the previous spring. Since 1984, summer degrees are included in the following fall. This methodology differs with other reports. "Enrolled" captures students enrolled any term during the year. All percents are cumulative for each entering fall term. Outlined area denotes new or revised data from previous Data Book.

Table 17 reports retention patterns for beginning freshmen enrolled from fall 1980 to fall 1987. Retention percentges include students who have graduated or are still enrolled. For example, of those freshmen who entered UIC in fall 1980, 27.6 percent have graduated or were still enrolled through eight years. Of the 2,282 students who enrolled as freshmen in 1987, 71.0 percent were still enrolled or have graduated. The retention rate appears to improve in the later cohorts.

Table 18 reflects a slightly different methodology than the previous tables. In this analysis, students were only counted as enrolled if still enrolled at the end of the year, consequently the enrolled and retention figures are somewhat lower than those presented in Tables 16 and 17.

The trend in graduation rates is somewhat lower with each successive cohort while enrollment is somewhat higher, thus yielding very little change in the overall retention rates of the 1983 through 1985 freshmen cohorts. Retention after four years is between 44 and 45 percent and after six years is at approximately 39 percent.

*The data were collected before the Summer 1990 degrees were posted. Some "enrolled" students would move to the "graduated" category if these degrees were included. Notes: Student withdrawals are reflected in the year in which they were officially posted. The degrees granted during the Summer are counted toward the preceeding academic year.



Table 19 reports enrollment, graduation, and retention rates for community college and four-year transfers who matriculated to UIC in fall 1984. This cohort was tracked for two years after transfer.

In fall 1984, 1,445 new students transferred from community colleges to UIC. Two years later 38 percent were enrolled and six percent had graduated. From four-year colleges, 1,201 new students transferred to UIC with 35 percent still enrolled and 10 percent graduated after two years.

GRADUATION PATTERNS FOR UIC 1980 FIRST TIME TRANSFER COHORT BY YEARS SINCE MATRICULATION






Table 20 reports cumulative graduation rates for first-time transfers who matriculated to UIC in fall 1980. This cohort was tracked for eight years after transferring. In fall 1980, 2,079 new transfers entered UIC. Of the initial transfer cohort, 26 percent graduated in the fourth year and 33 percent in the eighth year after matriculation. Although the graduation rate has increased since the cohorts of the early eighties, this display illustrates the long attendance patterns of UIC students.

Degrees Conferred UIC

HIGHLIGHTS

- In FY 1991, the campus conferred 4,917 degrees--the highest number of the eight-year period displayed in Table 21. This reflects increases at all levels.
- Table 22 displays the number of undergraduate degrees conferred by college since 1984. Although the number of degrees granted varies in most colleges from year to year, the College of Education conferred over 80 degrees in each of the last four fiscal years compared to 50 degrees in 1981. The number of degrees conferred in the largest college, Liberal Arts and Sciences, fluctuated somewhat over the period--ranging from just over 900 to just under 1200 baccalaureate degrees per year.
- Table 23 reports degrees conferred by gender in FY 1991. The overall percentage of males and females receiving degrees is almost equal with 49 percent of the degrees being conferred to males and 51 percent to females. The largest differences can be observed at the doctorate level and professional level.
- Tables 24 and 24.1 report the number and percent of FY 1991 degrees conferred by race/ethnicity. Overall, 66 percent of degrees were granted to white students compared to 67 percent in FY 1990. The percent distribution of baccalaureate degrees was 13 percent Asian/Pacific Islander, 9 percent Hispanic, and 7 percent Black. Each of these percents are higher than in FY 1990.

> Percent Change in UIC Degrees Conferred by Level -- FY 1984 and FY 1991







HIGHLIGHTS

- During the past ten years, enrollments on the Urbana campus were stable. As Figure 17 illustrates, undergraduate enrollment continues to represent approximately 75 percent of the total.
- As planned, fall 1991 beginning freshman enroll-ments decreased by 14 percent and new transfer enrollment increased by 15 percent over fall 1990 enrollments. Throughout the period, new freshmen have composed approximately 20 percent of undergraduate enrollment and new transfers, 5 to 7 percent. Refer to Table 26.
- Enrollments by college are reported in Tables 27 and 28. Fall 1991 undergraduate enrollments are lower in five colleges and higher in the other five colleges when compared to fall 1981. Figure 20 compares 1991 graduate enrollment by gender by college.
- Figures 21, 22, and 23 illustrate trends in enrollment by gender. Males continue to represent the majority of the undergraduate and graduate populations (56 percent and 62 percent respectively). However, the professional student cohort has changed from an approximate 2:1 male to female ratio in the early eighties to almost 1:1 in the late eighties.
- The racial/ethnic diversity of the undergraduate population increased significantly during the past decade as Figure 24 illustrates. The number of Illinois Black and white high school graduates has declined for the past several years, while the number of Hispanic and Asian high school graduates has increased. With the shrinking of the pool of Black students, continued expansion of university Black enrollments will become an increasingly difficult challenge.
- The maps in figures 27, 28, and 29 illustrate the geographical origin of first-time freshmen and graduate/professional populations. While the graduate/professional cohort represents a wider geographical distribution, over 90 percent of the first-time freshman cohort are Illinois residents.

UIUC FALL UNDERGRADUATE ENROLLMENT BY ADMISSION CATEGORY FALL 1981 - FALL 1991






UIUC New Student Enrollment Fall 1981 - Fall 1991






UIUC Graduate Enrollment Distribution by Gender and College Fall 1991



New Student Characteristics UIUC

HIGHLIGHTS

- The total number of beginning freshmen at UIUC ranged from 5000 to 6000 students in the last eleven years. In fall 1991, 5,042 beginning freshmen enrolled compared to 5,882 in 1990 and 5,786 in 1981. A decrease in the number of beginning freshmen was planned for fall 1991. See Table 33.
- Beginning freshman enrollment by college is lower for most colleges in 1991 than 1990 except in the Colleges of Agriculture and Applied Life Sciences. Since 1981 the enrollment patterns have varied by colleges. The largest college, Liberal Arts and Sciences, generally enrolled fewer students each year since 1985.
- New transfer enrollments increased by 15 percent over last year and 25 percent over 1984. The College of Engineering enrolled substantially more new transfers in 1991 than in years past.
- UIUC continues to attract top high school graduates, as illustrated in Tables 35 and 36. As in years past, nearly 90 percent of the UIUC new freshman students placed in the upper quartile of their respective high school classes.
- Figure 32 reports the number of first-time freshmen by county of origin. Cook and the collar counties around Chicago provide the largest numbers of beginning freshmen to UIUC; however, several downstate counties: Champaign, Peoria, St. Clair, and Sangamon also are large feeder counties.
- Figure 33 reports the number of new transfers by community college district. Parkland Community College and the College of DuPage are the two largest feeders to UIUC.





In October 1989, the American College Testing Program (ACT) introduced the Enhanced ACT Assessment. This test, usually taken by high school juniors and seniors, was similar but not identical to the previously used Assessment instrument. Because changes in the new test yielded differences in the scoring distribution, scores on the two tests are NOT interchangeable. ACT has published condordance tables which show scores on the former test to be equivalent to a higher score on the Enhanced Test. To convert the former score to an equivalent Enhanced score, the rule of thumb at the upper end is to add one (1) to the former test score and on the lower end to add anywhere from three to five points to the former score. Recent average scores for Illinois test takers are reported above in order to better compare the composite means.





Academic Performance UIUC

HIGHLIGHTS

- Graduation and retention patterns are reported in Tables 41 through 44 for beginning freshmen and transfers. The graduation rate after five years for freshmen ranges from 74.2 percent for the fall 1982 group to 76.5 percent for the 1984 group. For transfers, the fall 1987 cohort had a 69 percent graduation rate after three years and nearly 10 percent still enrolled.
- One-year retention rates by college are reported in Table 39.
 Overall, 91 percent of the freshman class was still enrolled on clear or probationary status at the end of their first year. Rates range by college from 85.7 percent to 93.2 percent.
- Table 40 tracks the mean grade point averages for the 1987 transfers from community college and four-year colleges for six semesters after transfer. The community college transfer cohort dropped over one-half of a grade point the first semester but improved steadily in the three succeeding terms.

Retention Rates for Beginning Freshmen One Year After Matriculation Fall 1990 Cohort



Reported above are enrollments and mean cumulative grade point averages for the fall 1987 cohort of new transfers to UIUC. This cohort was tracked for three years after transfer.

In fall 1987, 741 students from community colleges transferred to UIUC entering with a mean cumulative GPA of 4.26. After one semester, the mean GPA for this cohort dropped to 3.72. At the end of four semesters, or two years after transfer, the mean GPA for this cohort had increased to 3.97. Retention and graduation rates for this cohort are reported in Table 43 which shows that by the end of the fifth term, over fifty percent had graduated.

In fall 1987, 466 students from four-year colleges and universities transferred to UIUC entering with a mean cumulative GPA of 4.15. At the end of one semester, this cohort's mean GPA dropped to 3.86, a smaller decrease than experienced by the community college cohort. At the end of four semesters, or two years after transfer, the mean GPA for this cohort increased to 4.08. Retention and graduation rates for this cohort are also reported in Table 43.

Table 41 reports the percentage of fall 1980 to fall 1987 beginning full-time freshmen who have graduated. This Data Book presents graduation data revised from previous Data Books. In this case, degrees conferred during the summer term are counted with the previous year. In addition, cohorts are comprised of full-time beginning students only.

In fall 1982, 5,650 students enrolled as beginning freshmen and seven years later 78.4 percent of those students had received their baccalaureate degrees. The highest five year graduation rate is reported for the fall 1984 beginning freshman cohort with a 75 percent graduation rate. According to these data, the graduation rate continues to increase slightly.

Notes: Fall Beginning Freshmen include freshmen entering in the summer preceding the fall term. Degrees conferred during the summer are counted with the previous year. All percents are cumulative percents for each entering fall term.


Table 42 reports enrollment, graduation and retention patterns for fall 1982 to fall 1990 beginning freshmen cohorts. Retention percentages include students who have graduated during the year or are still enrolled at the end of the academic year. For example, of those freshmen who entered UIUC in fall 1982, 78.4 percent had graduated and 0.7 were still enrolled after seven years, to yield a retention rate of 79.1 percent.

*Most current data included: Summer 1991.

Notes: Fall Beginning Freshmen include freshmen entering in the summer preceding the fall term. Summer degrees are counted with the previous year. Enrollment figures are given for the percentage enrolled through that year. Year one, and so on, reflects the number of students enrolled through the first year and the number of degrees conferred during that year. All percents are cumulative percents for each entering fall term.

The above tables report cumulative enrollment, graduation, and retention rates for community college and four-year transfers who matriculated to UIUC in fall 1987. This cohort was tracked for three years after transfer.

In fall 1987, 741 new students transferred from community colleges to UIUC. Of that initial cohort, 508 students graduated after six semesters representing a graduation rate of 68.6 percent. From four-year colleges 466 new students transferred to UIUC and 319 (68.5 percent) graduated after three years. Compared to beginning freshmen three years after matriculation, transfer cohorts graduate at slightly lower rates but are still enrolled at slightly higher rates.

Degrees Conferred UIUC


HIGHLIGHTS

- In FY 1991, the campus conferred 400 more degrees (+4.5%) than in FY 1984 but 294 less (-3.1%) than in FY 1990. In the eight-year period displayed on Table 45, more degrees were awarded in 1990 than in any other year.
- As presented in Table 46, most of the larger colleges conferred fewer degrees in FY 1991 than in FY 1990. Comparing FY 1984 to FY 1991 shows mixed patterns by college. The largest college, Liberal Arts & Sciences, granted almost 15% fewer degrees than last year but nearly 25% more than in FY 1984.
- When comparing undergraduate degrees conferred by gender, from FY 1984 to FY 1991, the campus has changed from a 58 percent male and 42 percent female composition to a 55 percent male and 45 percent female composition. The colleges of Agriculture and Veterinary Medicine have reversed the gender distribution of degrees, now granting more baccalaureate degrees to females than males.
- Tables 48 and 48.1 report undergraduate degrees conferred by race/ethnicity. Compared to FY 1984, the percentage distribution of undergraduate degrees conferred to minority students has substantially increased. The number of degrees conferred to Asian and Hispanic students has doubled since 1984, degrees to Black students have increased by over 80 percent, while degrees to white students have declined by almost 6 percent.

Percent Change in UIUC Degrees Conferred by Level -- FY 1984 and FY 1991




