

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EXPLANATORY NOTES FOR RETENTION AND GRADUATION

Graduation and retention rates are the result of many variables including academic performance, academic preparation, motivation, and academic integration. Other factors which seem to influence graduation and retention include part/full-time attendance, student age, family responsibilities, commuter/resident attendance, firstgeneration college attendance, socioeconomic status, employment, and indebtedness. The extent to which these factors combine and contribute to graduation and retention is not fully understood, but there is a considerable body of research which has documented the complexities of the issue.

Throughout recent history the graduation rate of students in the United States who enter a university as beginning freshmen and earn bachelor's degrees from that same university four to six years later is approximately 50 percent. A freshman class with higher average ability, motivation, preparation, greater full-time attendance, etc. will graduate at higher rates than that average. The reverse is also true.

However, there are no hard and fast prediction models. The intervening variables are numerous and interrelated. For example, high motivation certainly can overcome under-preparedness just as low motivation can negate high ability. Better academic preparation may be the result of high academic ability or the consequence of higher socioeconomic status and thus a more positive high school environment.

It is tempting to compare institution-wide graduation rates among universities without accounting for the makeup of the student body. The reader is cautioned not to make blanket comparisons, for example, in the graduation and retention rates provided in this Data Book for the University of Illinois campuses. The student bodies of the campuses are different, and thus comparisons among the three would parallel the proverbial apples-to-oranges relationship.

One other caveat should be emphasized: Retention data presented in this and in previous Data Books were gathered from several different studies, each employing a slightly different methodology. The footnotes section of each table describes the definitions used for that table.



HIGHLIGHTS

- During the past ten years, total enrollment on the Urbana campus has been stable at about 36,000 students with fall 1998 total enrollment at 36,303. Undergraduate students number 27,452, the highest level in the last ten years. Graduate enrollment increased during the early nineties, then decreased after a high in 1993. Professional enrollment is somewhat lower than fall 1995, the highest level of the period. See Table 41 and Figure 32.
- Throughout the period, new freshmen accounted for just over 20 percent of undergraduate enrollment, and new transfers, 4 to 6 percent (Table 42). However, in fall 1998, the number of new freshmen increased sharply, by 11 percent compared to fall 1997, to the highest number in the period.
- Table 43 and Figure 34 show that fall 1998 undergraduate enrollment is higher in most colleges than in fall 1988. Table 44 displays 1998 graduate enrollment by college by level by gender. The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the College of Engineering enroll the highest numbers of students at both the undergraduate and graduate levels.
- Figures 35-37 and Table 45 illustrate trends in enrollment by gender. Males continue to represent the majority of the undergraduate and graduate populations; however, the percentages have decreased steadily. While the ratio of males to females was nearly 5:4 in the professional student cohort eight years ago, the ratio has nearly reversed recently.
 - The racial/ethnic diversity of the undergraduate student body increased significantly during the first half of the decade, then leveled off and in some cases, declined a little after recent peak years. Black and Hispanic students now represent 11 percent of the student body—over 12 percent of undergraduate and professional students and 6 percent of graduate students—half again the level of the late eighties. See Tables 46-47 and Figures 38-40.
 - Table 48 and the maps in Figure 41 illustrate the geographical origin of undergraduate and graduate/professional populations. In-state students moved from 92.6 percent of all undergraduates in 1992 to 90.3 percent in 1998.

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








UIUC FALL ENROLLMENT BY LEVEL AND GENDER FALL 1988 - FALL 1998






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





UIUC Undergraduate Minority Enrollment As a Percentage of Total Undergraduate Enrollment Fall 1988 - Fall 1998





New Student Characteristics UIUC

HIGHLIGHTS

- At 6,462, the 1998 freshman class is the largest of the period by some 350 students. See Table 49.
- Beginning freshman enrollment by college is higher in four colleges in 1998 compared to 1988. The largest college, Liberal Arts and Sciences, enrolled a high of 3,369 new freshmen in 1998, and a low of 2,426 in 1989. The decline in the College of Education is due in part to a shift in the enrollment of secondary education students to LAS.
- Table 50 shows new transfer enrollments are lower in 1998 than in 1997, the fourth year of decreased enrollment of transfers.
- UIUC continues to attract top high school graduates, as illustrated in Tables 51 and 52. The mean ACT composite score of the 1998 freshman class was 26.9, the highest by one-tenth of a point since use of the enhanced test began in 1991. More than 90 percent of freshmen in the College of Engineering bring an ACT:C score of 27 or higher. Also see Figures 42 and 43.

Tables 53-55 present selected demographics of the fall 1998 new students. The geographic characteristics such as origin, residency, and transfer institution are mapped in Figures 44-46. The Chicago metropolitan area provides the largest number of beginning freshmen to UIUC; however, several downstate counties--Champaign, St. Clair, and Peoria--also are large feeder counties. Parkland College and the College of DuPage send the largest numbers of transfer students to UIUC. New Students Page 90



Percent of Fall 1998 Beginning Freshmen from Top Ten Percent of H.S. Class by College of Entry







In October 1989, the American College Testing Program (ACT) introduced the Enhanced ACT Assessment. This test, usually taken by high school juniors and seniors, was similar but not identical to the previously used Assessment instrument. Because changes in the new test yielded differences in the scoring distribution, scores on the two tests are NOT interchangeable. ACT has published concordance tables which show scores on the former test to be equivalent to a higher score on the Enhanced Test. To convert the former score to an equivalent Enhanced score, the rule of thumb at the upper end is to add one (1) to the former test score and on the lower end to add anywhere from three to five points to the former score. Recent average scores for Illinois test takers are reported above in order to better compare the composite means.





Transfers By Sending Institution









HIGHLIGHTS

- One-year retention rates by college are reported in Table 56 and Figure 47. Overall, approximately 92 percent of the freshman class was still enrolled on clear or probationary status at the end of their first year.
 - Table 57 tracks the mean grade point averages for the 1987 transfers from community colleges and four-year institutions for six semesters after transfer. The community college transfers dropped over one-half of a grade point the first semester, but the group average improved in the succeeding terms.
 - Graduation and retention patterns are reported in Tables 58, 59 and Figures 48-50 for beginning freshmen and transfers. For freshmen, the graduation rate after seven years is nearly 80 percent. The graduation rate is somewhat lower for the more recent cohorts than for earlier cohorts. Women succeed at a slightly higher rate than men as shown in Table 58.1.
- For transfers, the graduation rate after four years for the fall 1991 cohort is almost 70 percent including about 1 percent still enrolled.

In fall 1987, 741 students from community colleges transferred to UIUC entering with a mean cumulative GPA of 3.26. After one semester, the mean GPA for this cohort dropped to 2.72. At the end of four semesters, or two years after transfer, the mean GPA for this cohort had increased to 2.97.

In fall 1987, 466 students from four-year colleges and universities transferred to UIUC, entering with a mean cumulative GPA of 3.15. At the end of one semester, this cohort's mean GPA dropped to 2.86, a smaller decrease than experienced by the community college cohort. At the end of four semesters, or two years after transfer, the mean GPA for this cohort increased to 3.08.




In fall 1987, 741 new students transferred from community colleges to UIUC. Of that initial cohort, 508 students graduated after six semesters, representing a graduation rate of 68.6 percent. From four-year colleges 466 new students transferred to UIUC and 319 (68.5 percent) graduated after three years. Compared to beginning freshmen five years after matriculation, transfer cohorts graduate at slightly lower rates but are still enrolled at slightly higher rates.








UIUC New Transfers






Degrees Conferred UIUC

HIGHLIGHTS

In FY 1998, the campus conferred about one percent more total degrees than ten years ago and one-half percent more than last year, though the number has declined since the period high in FY 1994. Master's and doctoral degree awards have increased since 1988, while bachelor's degrees are below the 1988 number. See Table 60 and Figure 51.

As presented in Table 61 and Figure 52, most colleges conferred fewer baccalaureate degrees in FY 1998 than in the late-eighties. The exceptions are the College of Applied Life Studies, which more than doubled the number of degrees awarded this past fiscal year compared to ten years ago, and the College of Fine and Applied Arts, which gave five percent more degrees than ten years ago.

From FY 1988 to FY 1997, about 45 percent of the undergraduate degrees went to female students. In FY 1998, the number shifted to 48 percent, reflecting a slowly increasing number of female enrollments. See Table 62.

Tables 63 and 63.1 report undergraduate degrees conferred by race/ethnicity. The percentage distribution of undergraduate degrees conferred to underrepresented students has substantially increased over the last ten years. The proportion of degrees conferred to minorities (Black and Hispanic students) has more than doubled since 1988, moving from 4.8 percent of total bachelor's degrees ten years ago to 10.0 percent in FY 1998. Baccalaureate degrees awarded to Asian students also have increased markedly, from 5.7 percent to 12.5 percent.



NUMBER OF UIUC UNDERGRADUATE DEGREES CONFERRED BY COLLEGE FY 1988 - FY 1998


