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### EXPLANATORY NOTES FOR RETENTION AND GRADUATION

Graduation and retention rates are the result of many variables including academic performance, academic preparation, motivation, and academic integration. Other factors which seem to influence graduation and retention include part/full-time attendance, student age, family responsibilities, commuter/resident attendance, first-generation college attendance, socioeconomic status, employment, and indebtedness. The extent to which these factors combine and contribute to graduation and retention is not fully understood, but there is a considerable body of research documenting the complexities of the issue.

Throughout recent history the graduation rate of students in the United States who enter a university as beginning freshmen and earn bachelor's degrees from that same university four to six years later is approximately 50 percent. A freshman class with higher average ability, motivation, preparation, greater full-time attendance, etc. will graduate at higher rates than that average. The reverse is also true.

However, there are no hard and fast prediction models. The intervening variables are numerous and interrelated. For example, high motivation certainly can overcome under-preparedness just as low motivation can negate high ability. Better academic preparation may be the result of high academic ability or the consequence of higher socioeconomic status and thus a more positive high school environment.

It is tempting to compare institution-wide graduation rates among universities without accounting for the makeup of the student body. The reader is cautioned not to make blanket comparisons, for example, in the graduation and retention rates provided in this Data Book for the University of Illinois campuses. The student bodies of the campuses are different, and thus comparisons among the three would parallel the proverbial apples-to-oranges relationship.

One other caveat should be emphasized: Retention data presented in this and in previous Data Books were gathered from several different studies, each employing a slightly different methodology. The footnotes section of each table describes the definitions used for that table.


### **HIGHLIGHTS**

- Total headcount enrollment at Springfield, 4,288, is higher than the past two falls. This fall saw the introduction of the freshman level, 116 Capital Scholars, in addition to 609 new transfer students. Undergraduate enrollment peaked in 1992 at 2,740, made a gradual decline, then rose in fall 2001 to 2,300 students. New undergraduate transfer and new graduate enrollment is higher this year than the previous five years, though enrollment of continuing undergraduate and graduate students is at one of the lowest points in the time span. See Tables 24-25 and Figure 20.
- Enrollment is divided at 2,300 undergraduates, 1,966 graduates, and 22 doctoral students.
- Table 26 shows large increases in undergraduate enrollment in the Colleges of Liberal Arts and Sciences and Public Affairs and Administration compared to 1991. The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences increased by the largest number of undergraduates, but some of the increase is due to programs being moved out of Education and Human Services and into LAS. See Figure 21.
- Fall 2001 enrollment by college and level and gender is displayed on Table 27 and ten-year trends by gender and level are shown in Table 28 and Figures 22-23. Campus-wide, female students have outnumbered male students throughout the period. Currently, female students represent 60 percent of students.
- Undergraduate enrollment of Black students increased into the mid-nineties then declined in number, but in 2001 rose to the highest proportion in the period. The previous high point was in 1995 at 192 students and 7.6 percent of the total, and the current level is 187 students and 8.1 percent. At the Master's level, the campus has seen substantial increases in Black student enrollment and representation; the number is now 162 students (8.2 percent) from a low of 99 students (5.3 percent). See Tables 29-30 and Figures 24-25. In 1998 a doctorate was introduced at UIS. The students in the program are quite diverse—over a quarter of the 22 students are African American.
- Figures 26 and 27 display the geographic distribution of Illinois students at UIS. Over 80 counties in Illinois are represented, though most students reside in Sangamon County at the time of their application. Table 31 shows that the student body represents 35 different countries with 177 international students. International student enrollment is up over 60 students from last year and more than double most of the previous falls in this period.

PAA = PUBLIC AFFAIRS & ADMIN.





### UIS Masters/Doctoral Enrollment Distribution by Gender Fall 1991 - Fall 2001







### GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION OF UIS STUDENT RESIDENCY FALL 2001



### GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION OF UIS STUDENT RESIDENCY FALL 2001



# New Student Characteristics UIS

### **HIGHLIGHTS**

- Fall 2001 marked the first class of freshmen students at UIS. The campus enrolled 116 students with all but 6 from Illinois and 29 coming from Sangamon County. Where the statewide mean ACT Composite score is 21.6, the UIS freshmen class mean is 25.1. A little over half are female and almost 90 percent are white. See Table 32 and Figure 28.
- Over the past ten-year period, new transfer enrollment moved from a high of 814 students in 1992 to a low of 481 in 1999; this fall 609 new transfers enrolled. From 1991 to 2001, Liberal Arts and Sciences more than doubled in size. With the closing of the Nursing program, the College of Education and Human Services experienced a decline of about 90 percent. See Table 33.
- Table 34 displays selected demographic statistics of the fall 2001 new transfer students. Somewhat more than a quarter of these students are age 30 or more compared to a third in 1996. Almost two-thirds are female, 85 percent are White, and one-third transfer from Lincoln Land College. Three out of every four students are enrolled part time.
- The map in Figure 29 plots the number of new transfer students in 2001 by the Illinois community college from which they last transferred and Table 35 shows the four-year trend in new transfer enrollment by sending institution. Students transferred from 32 of the 47 community colleges in 2001. Lincoln Land is the largest feeder at 211 students, followed by Illinois Central at 43 and Richland at 19. Over the past four years these same institutions sent a total of 717 students, 201 students, and 107 students respectively as the top feeder institutions in the period.
- The new graduate student cohort is older and somewhat more diverse in race/ethnicity than new transfers. Approximately two-thirds are part-time students, and almost 60 percent are female. See Table 36.





# Academic Performance UIS

#### **HIGHLIGHTS**

- Table 36 reflects the extended attendance patterns of undergraduates at UIS. In the fourth year after matriculation, 10 to 16 percent of the students, who begin at UIS primarily as juniors, are still enrolled. After eight years, between 49 and 58 percent graduate and some 3 percent are enrolled.
- Retention rates by school vary from year to year, but a snapshot of a single class shows a five-year graduation rate for the 1989 cohort of 51 percent in the College of Business and Management, 58 percent in the College of Education and Health Services, 60 percent in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, and 54 percent in the College of Public Affairs and Administration. See Table 38.
- FY 1992 FY 1994 graduates are aggregated in the display on Table 39 by the major in which they entered and the major in which they earned a degree. The vast majority of students earn a degree in the same major in which they begin at UIS. Of those who do change majors, graduates more often move to Child, Family, and Community Services; English; or Economics.

Fall beginning transfers include new full-time and part-time students entering either in the fall or summer preceding the fall term. The cohort includes degree-seeking students only; however, the definition used in this table (and in the next table, Table 36) is more inclusive than displayed in the other sections of this publication. Also please note that Table 35 includes degree-seeking students who are not enrolled in a college (undecided), while Table 36 excludes these students. "Enrolled" includes students enrolled anytime during the entire fiscal year; these data do not portray a snapshot of fall term enrollment only. Degrees granted during the summer term are counted with the subsequent fall. Thus, a student earning a baccalaureate degree in the summer following the second year after matriculation would be counted as graduated in the third year.

Table 35 illustrates that some students at UIS are enrolled well beyond the traditionally expected two years for junior-level transfers. For example, four years after entering UIS, between 10 and 15 percent of the cohort are still enrolled. Eight years after entering, some 3 to 4 percent are still enrolled. Graduation rates after eight years range from 49 to 58 percent for the 1984 through 1991 cohorts.

The following graph depicts the percentage still enrolled, graduated, and no longer enrolled of the 1990 cohort for the second through sixth years following matriculation. After two years, nearly 20 percent of the students graduated, with over 51 percent enrolled. By the sixth year following matriculation, 52 percent of the cohort had graduated, and almost 7 percent were still enrolled.

### UIS Beginning Transfers Retention Patterns for 1990 Cohort



# Degrees Conferred UIS

#### **HIGHLIGHTS**


- In FY 2001, UIS awarded 947 degrees—597 bachelor's degrees and 350 master's degrees. The number of baccalaureate degrees is one of the lowest in the ten-year period, while the number of master's degrees is the second highest. Total degrees granted is higher by about 10 percent compared to ten years earlier. See Table 40 and Figure 31.
- Like enrollment levels, Liberal Arts and Sciences conferred more degrees and posted a larger ten-year increase than did the other colleges at the bachelor's level, while Public Affairs and Administration granted the highest number and showed the largest percent increase at the master's level. Reorganization of the colleges may explain some of the changes in the numbers of degrees awarded from one year to the next. See Table 40.
- Table 41 shows degree conferred by gender. Females receive the majority of degrees awarded in every college and at each level, except for master's degrees awarded in the College of Business and Management.
- White students received 86 percent of the degrees awarded at Springfield, a slightly smaller proportion than in most of the last ten fiscal years. Tables 42 and 42.1 show that the largest minority, Black students, earned almost 8 percent of all degrees in FY 2001 (75 students), up from a low of just over 4 percent (38 students) in the early nineties. The representation of Asian/Pacific Islander students is higher now also. In the early ninties fewer than ten Asian-American students earned degrees at UIS, while in 2001, 21 Asian-American students were conferred with degrees.
